LATEST FROM UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, June 4th.—Intelligence from Mexico says that Maximilian had, on the evening of the 15th, a severe attack of dysentery, when private physicians of Escobedo were sent to him.

June 5.—A letter from Havana dated 29th May, says a Royal order has been received, valuing slaves at 400 dollars or less, which is about the expense of Chinese coolies, for eight years. This is looked upon as a decided step towards the abolition of slavery.

June 7.—Dates from San Luis, Potosi, May 17th, state that Maximilian's fate still hangs in the balance. Juarez and his ministers have held a conference on the subject of his disposal, but the conclusion they arrived at is yet unknown.

June 8.—A telegram from New Orleans narrates the immediate cause of the fall of Queretaro, and the capture of Maximilian and his army. It appears that Gen. Lopez, who is represented as the bosom friend of Maximilian, sold out the Imperial cause for 48,000 dollars in hard cash.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

By Atlantic Telegraph. ENGLAND London, June 2.—Despatches from Constantinople report that the sublime Porte consented to entrust the solution of the Cretan question to a commission of European powers.

June 5th.—It is understood to be the intention of the Sultan to visit Queen Victoria at London some time during the month of July after he has completed his visit to the Emperor Napoleon and Paris Exhibition.

June 6.—Lord Nass, Secretary for Ireland, announced in the House of Commons to-night, that the sentence of all the convicted Fenian prisoners had been commuted.

June 8th.—Intelligence has been received here, that the evacuation of the fortress of Luxemburg will be completed by the Prussians next week.

June 9th.—The party of Fenians who were arrested a few days ago while attempting to land in the county of Waterford, Ireland, say that they are from Boston, Massachusetts.

FRANCE.—Paris, June 1.—Extraordinary preparations are being made by the French government and the municipal authorities of Paris for the royal visitors, who are expected here on Monday.

June 2.—His Imperial Majesty Alexander of a Russia, arrived this afternoon from Berlin. It is announced that the Czar will extend his visit to London.

June 4th.—It is understood that as a result of meeting between the Emperors Napoleon and the Czar of Russia, they have agreed upon a plan for the settlement of Cretan difficulties, which will be proposed to other Great European Powers, and which it is hoped will be adopted by them, and urged upon the Sultan with their influence.

June 6th.—Another attempt upon the life of the Emperor Napoleon was made to-day, while he was returning from a grand review given in honor of his Imperial visitor the Czar of Russia on the Champ de Mars this afternoon. A pistol was fired at the carriage by some person in the crowd, but fortunately neither of the Emperors were injured.

Up to this time the assassin has not been arrested, but he cannot escape. PRUSSIA Berlin, June 4th.—The King of Prussia, accompanied by count Bismark, left for Paris this afternoon, on his promised visit to Napoleon and the French Exposition.

June 5th.—The plan of the Zollverein for all Germany, including the States of South Germany as well as those comprised in the North German Confederation, has been formed; the Chamber of Deputies of the Grand Duchy of Hesse have voted in favor of entering the North German Confederation.

It is semi-officially reported that the Prussian government has refused to comply with the expressed desire of the Emperor that it would pledge itself against any further arming of the fortress of Redstadt.

RUSSIA St. Petersburg, June 2.—The Imperial government has issued a proclamation extending general amnesty to the Poles engaged in the late insurrection in Russian Poland.

HUNGARY.—Pesth, June 7.—Lord Bloomfield, the British Ambassador to the Court of Austria, will be present at the crowning of Francis Joseph as King of Hungary, which takes place to-morrow, 9th inst. All powers having diplomatic relations with Austria will be represented on the occasion.

June 8.—The coronation of Francis Joseph of Austria as King of Hungary occurred to-day in the presence of a great concourse. The ceremonies were impressive and the greatest enthusiasm prevailed.
