

and continues to increase with the prolongation of the frost. The workhouse is full—in the able-bodied men and women's departments more than full—and upwards of 4000 people are maintained at the public expence in one establishment alone, while out-door relief is granted to 16,000 individuals.

FRANCE.—Paris, Jan. 29.—It is said that Maximilian has issued a manifesto against the arrangement made between France and the United States, in regard to Mexico.

Jan. 30.—It is thought here that the mission of Kalergis to the United States, is a Russian intrigue to involve the American Government in the Eastern Question.

Despatches from the East state that a plot of the Cretan clergy, against Mustapha Pacha, has been discovered.

Feb. 1.—The Gazette De Tribuneax contains an editorial protesting against the rendition of Lamiaude, the defaulter, to the British Government.

The Imperial army will camp this year near this city, and not Chalons as usual.

A dinner was given near Paris the other day, of which the principal dishes were shark, horse, dog, rat, cat, hippopotamus and young monkey.

Marseilles, Jan. 28.—The Monitor Miantonoma is now lying in this harbor, and is daily crowded with curious and admiring visitors.

SPAIN.—Madrid, Feb. 1.—More than one hundred arrests have been made in this city recently, of persons believed to be connected with revolutionary schemes.

AUSTRIA.—Vienna, Jan. 30.—Surveys for the new boundary line between the territories of Austria and Italy have been fully completed.

PRUSSIA.—Berlin, Jan. 30.—Capt. Warner of the Prussian navy is going to America on a special mission.

Feb. 2.—Count Bismark has refused to declare the policy to be pursued by Germany with regard to the differences between France and Russia on the one side and the Prussian Government on the other.

GREECE.—Athens, Jan. 30.—It is Gen. Kalergis and not Rangarso who is to go on a mission to the United States.

The Greek Government is about to raise the tariff, and expects by this means to increase the revenue by one and a half million drachmas.

Feb. 1.—It is impossible for the Government of Greece to prevent volunteers from leaving for Crete. Fifteen hundred soldiers have just departed to aid their struggling brethren in that island.

ITALY.—Florence, Jan. 30.—Admiral Persano, who has just been acquitted of the charges of cowardice, is now to be placed on trial for incompetency and disobedience to his superior officers.

Count Baral has been appointed Italian Ambassador to the Court of Vienna.

La France publishes a harrowing description of the prevailing distress in Italy. In Venice 30,000 out of 110,000 inhabitants are receiving relief from public charity. A crisis has commenced at Verona. In Sardinia the peasants are reduced to the necessity of eating herbs and roots like will beasts.

PAPAL STATES.—Brigandage is on the increase in the Pontifical States. A band of 25 brigands recently entered the ancient Abbey of Valvisciolo, near Velletri, and lived on the friars for eight days, consuming all the provisions in the monastery. They captured Signor Ricci, a rich proprietor of Velletri, and carried him off as a hostage, demanding from his family a ransom of 4000 crowns.

TURKEY.—A declaration of the Christian people of Epirus and Thessaly has been published, in which they express their determination to cast off the yoke of the Sultan, and call upon their Mahomedan fellow countrymen to join them or at least not to turn against them. It is said that France and Austria have resolved on a joint application to the Sultan in favor of his Christian subjects. According to the Viennese papers Prussia, Italy and Russia have agreed to back up the application, and it is believed at Vienna that England will also adhere to the proposition.

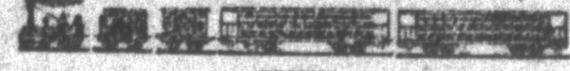
