ENGLAND. - London, July 8 - The Govern ment announces that the sixpenny postage between America and England will be put into operation about 1st of January, 1868.

July 9 .- The Sultan of Turkey has accepted the invitation of the Emperor of Austria to visit him in Vienna. It is accordingly announced that the Sultan will return to Constantinople by way, of Vienna where he will remain one week the guest of the Emperor Francis Joseph.
