Chatham, Dec. 16.—Schr Anna Lenora, from Nova Scotia, is ashore on the bar at this place. Crew saved. Vessel and cargo (wood) will be a total loss.

Southampton, Dec. 6.—The bark Eugenie, 533 tons, of Windsor, Nova Scotia, Captain Masters, bound from London for Boston, was towed in here to-day, with loss of chains, anchors, and windlass, sustained in a violent gale from the N N W, which she experienced on Monday and Tuesday last, while at anchor off the North Foreland. A shift of wind to the N E on Tuesday enabled the bark to round the Goodwin, and while working her way down the Channel, off the Goodwin, a large schooner, which was a little distance from the Eugenie, was seen to strike on the Beach and go down with all hands. Her name was not known, and from all that could be seen on board the bark there was no chance of escape for any of the schooner's crew. The Eugenie will repair here, and proceed on her voyage. Her cargo, consisting of general merchandise, is partially damaged.
