## Province of Nova Scotia.

THE HALIFAX ASSOCIATION FOR IMPROVING THE CONDITION OF THE POOR held its Second Annual Meeting on Wednesday. It was evident from Reports read that much had been done last winter to relieve the wants of the poor. The management of the Society is to be similar to what it was last year. The Mayor is President; W. S. Sterling, Esq., Treasurer; M. H. Kichey, Secretary.

The Society expended last winter in orders for fuel, bread and other necessities near \$3000. The society is resuming its philanthropic operations. The blessing of many who are ready to perish comes upon the visitors.

A fatal accident occurred at Maitland last week, by which a young lad lost his life. The following are the particulars as near as we can learn: Two young lads named Cox, had taken a gun out of the house; one of the boys pointed the gun at his brother in a playful manner, not knowing that the piece was loaded, which went off instantly, the ball taking effect in the back of his head. This is another warning to parents to keep fire-arms out of their children's way. We have it on good authority that a young lad on Brier Hill, has on more than one occasion been allowed to carry a loaded doublebarrelled gun to school with him.—*Truro Mirror.*

RAILWAY ROUTE.—It appears that the Dominion Government have adopted a compromise line between Truro and Amherst; thus satisfying the advocates of the Folly route and of the Acadia mines route. The compromise will lengthen the road somewhat. The government has under consideration the route in New Brunswick.

THE NEW ZEALAND COMPANY.—The brig "Emulous," Capt. Cumming, hence for New Zealand, was spoken on the 26th of September, 3250 miles from Halifax. All well.

At the late Emigration Conference, at Ottawa, Messrs. Wetmore and Beckwith were present from New Brunswick. Nova Scotia was not represented.

WINDSOR.—We learn by a letter from Dr. H. H. Read to the Amherst Gazette respecting the Schools of Windsor that—during the year just ended, this section has employed five teachers and one assistant. The number of registered pupils has been 350, with an average attendance of 225.

A year ago the sum of \$1000 was voted for the support of schools, without a dissenting voice. This year the trustees asked for the same sum, but the meeting considered that amount too small and voted \$1200.

The new school house has been completed, and the old one fitted up with patent desks and wall maps throughout—the whole at a cost of \$6,100. Of this amount, \$4,000 had been voted in 1863, and the trustees asked for an additional vote of \$2,100, which, with the preceding, was passed with perfect unanimity.

This is highly creditable to the township of Windsor.

Windsor has now a stipendiary Magistrate and a Police Constable. It will doubtless soon become as quiet and orderly as Halifax.

MAITLAND.—The Mail says: the dwelling house of Capt. A. McDougall, Maitland, was discovered to be on fire on Monday afternoon. The main building was destroyed. The smaller house was saved after the fire had burned through the roof. The furniture, &c., which was saved from the devouring element, was much damaged by the heavy rain. Capt. McDougall is at present in Great Britain.

SYDNEY C. B.—The News says in reference to the late School meeting: The proceedings therat were harmonious and satisfactory. The report of the Trustees, for the past year, was carefully prepared and ample in its details of particulars and facts—financial and scholastic. The amount, suggested in the report for the incoming year, was over \$690, which was voted without dissent. The outgoing Trustee, by ballot, was C. H. Harrington, Esq., who received a renewal of the trust by an almost unanimous vote. The reappointment of that gentleman was most judicious, in consideration of his past fidelity and zeal in the cause of Education.

THE LATE EXHIBITION.—We learn from the Journal of Agriculture that the Commissioners have resolved to publish a full report of the Exhibition, prizes, &c.

The Commissioner of Railways, A. Longley, Esq., has published a letter vindicating himself from charges which have recently appeared in some of the papers, complaining of the Railway management. He shews that for several years past there have been fewer accidents than on most of the ordinary lines.

BOOKS.—A petition is under signature for the repeal of the present duty of five per cent. on Books, pamphlets, &c.

P. E. ISLAND.—Arrangements have been made for resuming Telegraphic communication between the Island and the mainland.

The Sons of Temperance Gymnastic Club is resuming active operations in the Reading Room, Temperance Hall.

A New York detective has recovered the \$10,000, (less about \$40), recently stolen from Captain Sargent of Yarmouth, N. S. The thief was about to step on board a California steamer when he was arrested.

The two men Garwood and Carr arrested on a charge of embezzlement at Manchester, were brought up before Judge Wilkins on Saturday, who decided to remand them till the arrival of the next steamer from England.

Five soldiers were found on Friday night making a disturbance at a tavern in Albemarle Street. They offered great resistance but three were captured. On Saturday they were handed over to the military authorities.

The Supreme Court is still in session in Halifax. There are no cases of much general interest.

CIVIC.—The Council have reappointed the city officials. A committee was appointed to ascertain the value of property necessary to be taken in the extension of Lockman street south to Jacob street. Ald. Barron, Davis, and Troop were appointed the committee.

YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION.—A large number of young men attended the prayer meeting at Salem Chapel on Sunday last. The Rev. Charles Grant, who is about leaving Halifax to engage in missionary labor in the East Indies gave an earnest address exhorting all to full and continued consecration to Christ.
