





The present source of supply has only been made use of since 1865, and it is estimated that it cannot be exhausted in a thousand years.

TRANSPLANTING IN THE NIGHT .- AD exchange informs us that last spring and summer he made the following experiment : He transplanted ten cherry trees while in bloom, commencing at four o'clock in the afternoon, and transplanted one each hour until one in the morning. Those transplanted in the daylight shed their blooms, producing little or no fruit, while those planted during the darker portions maintained their condition fully. He did the same with ten dwarf pear trees after the fruit was one-third grown. Those transplanted during the day shed their fruit; those transplanted during the night perfected their crop, and showed no injury from having been removed. With each of these tres, he removed some earth with the roots. This suggestion is of sufficient importance to attract theattention of farmers and others who intend to transplant trees.

GOING TO FLEEP. - The following is a valua! ble recipe, whether it be efficacious must be a matter of experience. If it be found so on proof it will be to many invaluable :

The secret of being able to sleep at-will is the power to fix the attention upon the breathing. In all Southern Russia, around the Black Sea, the granary of Europe, and in the neighboring States of Turkey, reports indicate an unusually good crop of wheat. The same may be said of the grain prospects of California, fast becoming the most important grain-raising State in the Union, and of other sections of the West. -Boston Traveller.


