

tionary. At half-past two this morning, the House voted on first of Mr. Gladstone's resolves and the count stood as follows: For resolves 330, against 265, majority 65. The announcement was received with loud and prolonged cheering from liberal benches. Mr. Disraeli rose amidst profound silence and said this decision so altered the relations of the Ministry and the House of Commons that the Government needed time to consider what action it would likely take. He accordingly moved the House to adjourn till Monday. Motion carried at 3 p. m.

Evening.—The belief has become more current that after the passage of the Reform Bills for Ireland and Scotland, Mr. Disraeli will dissolve the Parliament and appeal to the people on the Irish Church question. The "Globe" of this evening confirms this opinion.

May 2.—The crisis in the British Cabinet occasioned by the recent division on the subject of the Irish Church, monopolizes the public attention to-day. It is thought that if the measures which are in effect approved by both Houses, are not opposed by the Liberals, the present Cabinet will not resign or dissolve Parliament until an appeal can be made to the new constituencies.

It is said to-day that the Prime Minister Disraeli had tendered his resignation, but it was not accepted. Gladstone on Monday, will move to suspend all orders, and take up resolutions introduced by him relating to the Irish Church. If the resolutions are carried out, it is thought that an Address to the Queen will follow.

A despatch states that Cranelli, the Austrian Ambassador at Rome, had arrived at that city yesterday.

May 4.—A Hong Kong letter of February 26th says that Prussia was negotiating for the accession of the Island of Chausau to Germany, and thus place the interests of the Confederation in the command of a great highway of the China and Japan trade.
