HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

And whereas Brandies and other Spirits are usually exported from Europe in casks or other packages, containing less than one hundred gallons, whereby such goods, when imported into Canada, would become liable to forfeiture as aforesaid, unless excepted from the operation of the Act refered to,-Therefore His Excellency in Council, on the recommendat on of the Honorable the Minister of Customs, and under the authority given by the said Act, has been pleased to make the following "Regulation."
"All importations of spirits made direct to Canada
