# Agriculture, &c.,

### Weeds vs. Carrots.

Every one knows how difficult it is to protect young carrots from being smothered by the uprising weeds. The weed seeds get the start of the carrot seeds, and keep it too, unless there is great diligence on the part of the cultivator to subdue the rival of the carrots for possession of the ground. The weed seeds have possession of the ground, and lie there dormant, already softened and at the very point of vegetation, waiting only for warmth, light and air to enable them to peep out. The cultivator very kindly stirs up theground for them, and they almost instastly come forth in all their glory, and destroy the object of the cultivator. My plan of heading off the weeds, and giving the carrots so much the start that, with little labor, a good crop is almost certain to be the result, is simply to prepare the seed before sowing in this way: Pour water on the seed, so hot that one can barely hold the finger in it; stand in quite a warm place for ten or twelve hours; drain off the water and mix well with very fine, clean, moist sand, using large bowls, deep dishes or shallow boxes. So treated, the seeds soon begin to sprout. Examine carefully, and when the sprouts appear let them dry off, sift out the sand and they are ready for sowing; or if sowed hy hand, the seeds and sand can be sown together. Thus treated they get the start of the weeds, and keep it too, -appearing above ground before the weeds have time to " breathe the air of life." The carrots, being easily seen, can be protected from being smothered by the weeds. I adopt the plan of sprouting almost all kinds of seeds for my garden, especially when planting is retarded by unfavourable, cold or wet weather. Sprouting peas, lettuce, potatoes, beets, carrots, corn, cucumbers, melons, &c., gains much time and insures positive success. I hope some of your readers will try the experiment and report results. - Cor. Country Gen-

MEASURING ROOT CROPS IN THE BIM .- An exchange says : - The following rule for ascertaining the number of bushels of apples, potatoes, ect., in bins and boxes, is recommended as simple and accurate: For the number of "even" bushels, multiply the number of cubic feet in the bin by 8 and point off one decimal. For "heaped" bushels multiply by 8 twice and point off two.

Flax-seed occasionally given to horses or cattle will make them shed their old hair, and whether young or old, soon get sleek and fat. It is the only thing which will tatten some old horses.

There are queer ways of getting a living in London. A man was brought before Alderman Hale lately, charged with "intruding" into the sewers for the purpose of catching rats. He was caught coming up a trap with a bag containing thirty live rats. The alderman refused to punish the man, thinking that by catching the rats he was doing a service to the town. The man protested that he did a great deal of good. It did not occur to the alderman, however, to ask what he did with the rats. If the question had been asked, the man would have been obliged to own that he sold them for the purpose of being worried in pits by sporting dogs. Perhaps the encouragement of this barbarous sport is not doing so much service as the alderman supposed.
