

The United States.

On the 8th inst., the FRENCH CANADIAN CONVENTION at Springfield, in the United States, condemned the Confederation of the British Provinces and passed strong resolutions in favor of their Annexation to the United States. NEW YORK, Oct. 12—Gold 136 3/4.

The WHEAT crop in the United States is pronounced less per acre than last year, but the increase of acres sown will make the quantity above an average.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

The Prince of Wales laid the corner stone of a new University in Glasgow. The Princess was on the platform, they were loudly cheered. A new deep sea Submarine Telegraph direct from Malta to Alexandria, Egypt, was successfully completed on the 3rd inst.

SPAIN—The Provisional Junta at Madrid, has issued a proclamation, guaranteeing many reforms: Universal Suffrage, Religious Liberty, Freedom of the Press, Change in system of Education, Right of Trial by Jury, Equality of all men before law, and Judges of Courts to be appointed for life.

The leaders of the Junta are monarchical in their preferences, but have agreed to accept a Republic, if the people so pronounce at the election.

The Cubans demand that their Island be represented at the deliberations of the provisional Junta.

Don Juan, a cousin of Queen Isabella, has resigned his pretension to the throne of Spain in favor of his son Don Carlos.

The provisional Junta had issued a decree, reducing by one-third the tariff on all imports.

There is another eruption of Mount Vesuvius.
