Agriculture, &c.

A good receipt for keeping boys on the farm.

We have receipts innumerable for preserving all kinds of fruits for a long period. Here is a good one for preserving boys for a whole lifetime—on the farm. Let every farmer who has boys try it. It is warranted to do no harm.

Another thing, the boys want an interest in the business, and the sooner you give them an investment in the farm or its stock, the more likely you will be to make farmers of them. It is true, the law gives you the right to the avails of their labors until they reach their majority. It may be true that these services are no more than a fair compensation for the expenses of their childhood. The intercourse of parents and children should not always be graduated by the legal scale. You do not want your son for a servant, but for a companion, and a support in your declining years. You want to attach him by affection and interest to the soil that he cultivates. Begin, then, early to identify his interests with your business, as if he was under no obligations to you. If he fancies stock, give him what he likes, and let the increase be his. Especially encourage him to plant orchards or vineyards of the finest varieties of fruit. Teach him to bud, graft, prune, ripen and market all the fruits of your climate. Furnish him with all the books and facilities that he needs to study and to practice pomology and horticulture. If properly encouraged he will take an interest in these things very early, and before he is old enough to think of leaving your roof, his tastes will be formed, and his course in life will be determined. His heart will go down into the soil with the roots of every fruit tree that he plants, and the orchards and gardens of the old homestead, or of another close by, will be his paradise, from which nothing but necessity can drive him.—*Agriculturist.*

The oyster crop of New York is worth \$3,000,000, equal to the value of the wheat, rye and buckwheat crops of the State, or that of all the yellow corn grown in Massachusetts.

ANIMALS THAT CHEW THE CUD.—Ruminating animals gather their food rapidly, give it a few cuts with the teeth, and swallow it. It goes to an interior receptacle, where it is moistened; this is very essential if it be dry hay. When the animal has filled himself, he masticates the food thus stowed away in his stomach, raising it cud by cud. When a portion is completely masticated, it passes to another receptacle and the progress of digestion goes on. Thus an ox, if let to himself, will raise and masticate all the food thus stowed away in his stomach. If he be pushed and worked hard, and does not have much time to masticate, he falls off in flesh, his health is poor, his digestion incomplete. The horse, on the contrary, however much in a hurry he may be, must masticate each mouthful before he swallows it. A hungry ox let into a meadow will fill himself in twenty minutes, while a horse would want at least an hour and twenty minutes to take the same amount of grass.

DISEASE AMONG HORSES.—The Metford Monitor is informed that a disease, which in general proves fatal, has recently made its appearance among the horses in that town ship—nine having already within a few weeks died in the neighbourhood. It discovered in time and bleeding resorted to, the horse will in general be saved. The lights of those that have died, when opened, have been found distended with clots of blood.

INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY.

TO CONTRACTORS.

THE undersigned is instructed by the Governor-General of Canada to inform intending contractors that, at an early day, tenders will be invited for the execution of certain portions of the Intercolonial Railway between Riviere du Loup and Rimouski, in the Province of Quebec; between Truro and Amherst, in the Province of Nova Scotia, and between Dalhousie and Bathurst, in the Province of New Brunswick. It is intended to let the work in sections, or divisions, varying from fifteen to thirty-five miles, according to the situation and local circumstances. The surveys are now in progress, and in part completed, and the object of this notice is to afford intending contractors ample opportunity of examining the ground to be done. The plans, profiles, specifications, conditions of contract, forms of tender and other documents required for the information and guidance of contractors, are now being prepared, and when ready, of which due notice will be given, may be seen at the Railway Engineers' offices in Halifax, St. John, Dalhousie, Rimouski, Riviere du Loup, and at Ottawa.
