

Queens Co.—Edward McLeod, of Brooklyn, John A. Delap and Thomas Day, of Liverpool, to be Commissioners of new Bridge at Liverpool.

Halifax Co.—James Thompson and Augustus C. West to be Commissioners of Schools. Lunenburg Co.—Rev. D. C. Moore to be a Commissioner of Schools for the Township of New Dublin.

A NEW SCHOOL HOUSE to accommodate 500 pupils is to be erected in Morris Street. Messrs Malcom and Johnson have taken the contract.

We learn that the sum of \$10,000 has been voted by the Dominion Government for the purchase of the site, and for the building of an Hospital and a Quarantine Station at the port of Halifax.

GOLD—We have just been shown by Mr. W. T. Townsend two bars of gold, weighing 90 ounces, the work of ten men for six weeks at Tangier, the yield being equal to three ounces per ton of quartz. The total cost was about \$1200, the value of gold being nearly \$1800, thus leaving a clear profit of \$600, after paying all expenses. The diggings at Tangier are now doing well, though last summer they were all but totally abandoned as unprofitable—Express.

LIBERAL.—The Great Western Railway Company gave the members from Nova Scotia free use of the railway during the Eastern holidays. The thanks of the members were returned to the company for the same through W. H. Ray, Esq., M. P. P. for Annapolis.

POLICE INCIDENTS.—A man named William Smith—a common drunkard, lodged in the Police Station one night last week, attempted to hang himself by means of his handkerchief, but on its breaking the noise aroused attention, and he received a sentence of 90 days at Rock-head.

An unfortunate woman the next night gave birth to a child while incarcerated at the Police Station.

A Mural Tablet has, during the past week, been placed in the chancel of St. George's Church, by the parishoner of the Parish, to the memory of their late Curate, Rev. Thomas Crisp. The work was executed by Messrs. Wesley & Sandford of this city, and does them credit for the manner in which it has been performed.

The "Rosebud Band of Hope" intend giving an entertainment at Temperance Hall, early in May.

MAJOR-GENERAL HASTINGS DOYLE, Lieut-Governor and Commander of the Forces in Nova Scotia who has arrived in England on short leave of absence, it is reported is to receive the honor of Knighthood for his valuable civil and military services in that Colony during late threatened complication of affairs between the United States and Canada. It is not improbable that the Companionship of the Bath will be conferred on this distinguished officer.—Court Journal.

THE HALIFAX COUNTY SESSIONS met in the Court House, on Monday last, for the purpose of electing a County Treasurer, in the place of the late John Naylor, Esq. There were present sixty-five magistrates. The candidates for the office were: Messrs. W. Twining, W. Evans, J. H. Liddell, Thos. S. Tobin, and W. E. Brine. On the fourth ballot between Messrs. Evans and Liddell, the vote stood for Mr. Evans 34, for Mr. Liddell 31. W. Evans, Esq., is therefore, Treasurer, for Halifax County.

It was decided previous to the election, that the salary should be \$800 per annum.

YARMOUTH.—We learn from the Herald that a most destructive fire occurred in this town on Monday morning, the 20th inst. Property to the amount of about \$30,000 was destroyed; the insurance on which will not amount to more than \$12,000. The heaviest loser is Robert Brown, Esq. His dwelling house and other property lost, is valued at \$13,000, on which there was but \$3,200 insured. The large hotel known as the "American House" was entirely consumed. The "Acadia Hotel" also suffered much damage, and great loss will fall on parties doing business in the stores beneath. It is believed that the origin of the fire was the work of incendiarism. Efforts are being made to discover the perpetrator.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE, OTTAWA, MONDAY, 6th April, 1867.

PRESENT:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS, by the 81st section of the Act 31 Vic., Cap. 6, entitled: "An Act respecting the Customs," it is enacted that—"Except in cases which by any regulation to be made by the Governor in Council, may be excepted from the operation of this section, all spirit (unless in bottle and imported from the United Kingdom, or in bond from a Bonded Warehouse in some British Possession) brought into Canada, in casks and packages of less size than to contain one hundred gallons, shall be forfeited."

And whereas Brandies and other Spirits are usually exported from Europe in casks or other packages, containing less than one hundred gallons, whereby such goods, when imported into Canada, would become liable to forfeiture as aforesaid, unless excepted from the operation of the Act referred to,—Therefore His Excellency in Council, on the recommendation of the Honorable the Minister of Customs, and under the authority given by the said Act, has been pleased to make the following "Regulation."

"All importations of spirits made direct to Canada from European Ports, shall be and they are hereby excepted from the operation of the 81st section of the Act 31 Vic. Cap 6, intitled, 'An Act respecting the Customs,'"
