

RAILWAY TO DIGBY.—A public meeting was held on the 9th Inst., at which it was unanimously resolved that the railway ought to be extended to Digby; and whereas the road from Kentville to Annapolis is now graded, therefore resolved, That the Provincial Government be respectfully requested to cause a survey to be made as soon as possible of a railway from Annapolis to Digby."

SAD ACCIDENT.—Miss Melinda Dalrymple daughter of James Dalrymple, was drowned on the 31st ult., in Moose Brook, Douglas, Hants Co. She was returning from Noel, with horse and wagon, and attempting to cross the creek before the tide was sufficiently out, she met with her death. Her remains were found near the shore. The horse was found at a short distance, struggling in the water with the waggon attached to him.

NARROW ESCAPE FROM DROWNING.—On Tuesday, the 27th ult., a child of Mr. Elkanah Lohnes, of New Germany, County of Lunenburg, fell through a hole in Varner's Bridge, near the residence of N. Chesley, Esq., and floated some distance down the stream to Mr. Caleb Feindal's mill dam, where she was rescued by Mr. Elias Varner.

Mr. John Brown, formerly of "Greenwood Farm," Falmouth, died suddenly at San Juan, La., in October last.

On and after January next the charge for telegrams by the Atlantic cable will be reduced from £3 7s to £2 for ten words.

WOLFVILLE.—On Wednesday last the brig "Jones Brothers," arrived here with three locomotives for the Windsor and Annapolis Railway. Their names are taken from Longfellow's "Evangeline, which has made Wolfville celebrated. One of them is called "Gaspereaux," the second "Gabriel," and the third "Evangeline."

THE INTERCOLONIAL.—A surveying party under the direction of William Hazen, Esq., are at work on the Intercolonial railway line in Colchester Co.

MACKEREL have appeared in the Halifax fish market during the past week, and sold from 8 to 12 cents each.

CUMBERLAND COUNTY.—At the recent Commissioners meeting the Inspector, Mr. George gave a very satisfactory report of the school districts of that county.

During the last term 116 schools have been in operation in the County, taught by 117 teachers who instructed 5000 scholars. But 14 sections have been without schools and some of these are preparing for them by building school houses. Fifty new school houses, with accommodations for 58 teachers, have been built in the County since the new School Law came into operation, besides three which were maliciously burnt.

There are five graded schools, viz:—At Amherst, Pugwash, Wallace, Mill Village, and Advocate, with 16 teachers, and 966 scholars.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—On Tuesday the 3rd Instant, a boat having in it twelve persons, a number of whom were young ladies, who were going from a religious meeting at Homeville, Cow Bay, C. B., on passing under the bridge by some means the boat struck some sunken timber and upset precipitating them into water. All the company sought to get to the shore. On landing it was found that five ladies were missing. The young men immediately returned, and found that the ladies were under the boat. They soon lifted it and all floated down with the rapid stream till they came to shallower water. On being brought to land it was found that two of the party—one a daughter of Mr. William Holmes and the other a daughter of Mr. Arnold Holmes, aged respectively 16 and 22 years, were drowned. The meeting was one in our Brother Spinney's field of labor and in which there has been deep interest felt. This sad circumstance is referred to by Bro. Boggs in another column.

THE DETAINED EMBEZZLERS.—The value of the Telegraph for overtaking escaped criminals has been put to the test during the past week in our Supreme Court. The prisoners arrested on receipt of a telegram from Manchester a week or two since, were brought up again before Judge Johnston.

Hon. Mr. McCully moved for their discharge on the following grounds: 1st. The writ under which the prisoners were committed was not a judicial writ. 2nd. It had no seal. 3rd. It contained no certain specification of the crime. 4th. It had no proper conclusion.

Mr. McCully refused to allow that any legal authority could be given to a telegram. The Hon. Attorney General objected to the cases cited by Mr. McCully, and showed that a legal warrant had been obtained before the telegram was sent. He further argued that the ends of justice and law of nations demanded that the telegram in the present case should have the force of law.

Judge Johnston reserved his judgment. ACCIDENT AT YARMOUTH.—On the 5th inst., Mr. James Huntingdon was duck shooting at a place called Close Reef, in company with a boy named Derrelaire, when his gun burst, shattering his left hand. The boy rowed him to land, and assisted him to a house. Medical assistance was obtained, the hand amputated, and Mr. Huntingdon is doing well. The boy escaped with only a slight scratch, and made no complaint; he retired to bed, where he was afterwards found dead. An inquest was held, and the jury found a verdict that he came to his death through over exertion and excitement.—Chron.

INSANE.—Edmund Symons, the young colored man convicted in the Supreme Court a few days ago, for stabbing, has been pronounced insane.

The missing man, Charles Dunphy, is supposed to have been drowned at Hamilton's wharf on Thursday night last.

CHILL.—An election of a most extraordinary kind has been held in Valparaiso. The ecclesiastical authorities of the city had called together the people for the purpose of choosing out of the list of saints one as patron saint and protector for the city. The election was exciting in the extreme, many hundred saints having been nominated, but Jesus Christ obtained a brilliant majority, having polled 19,946 votes, "the most holy Virgin" following with 4,132; sundry odd saints putting in a disgracefully poor show, among the whole of 884. The election was closed on Sept. 5, the result being declared on Sunday, when a sermon was preached by Senor Casanova and a solemn Te Deum sung to celebrate the joyful event.
