Province of Nova Scotia.

Halifax has twenty-one Temperance organizations.

A proposal has been made to hold a Mechanics Fair in Halifax next year.

In the Police Court on Tuesday 21st inst. eight persons were fined in sums ranging from ten to eighty dollars, for selling liquor without a license.

SAD ACCIDENT.—The Amherst "Gazette" of the 23rd inst., says: "It is believed that on Saturday night last five young men of Onslow and Londonderry, or thereabouts, were drowned while returning in a boat from Annapolis, whence they had gone for apples. The boat was afterwards found bottom up, and four of the hats drifted ashore.

THE ELECTION IN INVERNESS COUNTY has resulted in the return of Hugh McDonald, it is reported by 990 votes against 938 for Hiram Blanchard, giving a majority of 52 for McDonald.

THE GRAND DIVISION OF THE SONS OF TEMPERANCE is at present in session in Halifax. A large number of Delegates are in town from various parts of the Province, east and west.

A SOIREE is to be held in the Reading Room, after which there will be a public Temperance meeting.

NO ESCAPE.—The Atlantic cable was brought into requisition a few days ago, and rendered available in behalf of justice. The City Marshal received a cable despatch from the Chief of Police in Manchester, England, requesting him to watch the arrival of the steamer from England at this port, and arrest two parties, supposed to be on board, for embezzlement of a large sum of money.

We hear that the despatch from England cost £21.

The men were brought before Judge Wilkins on Monday. Mr. Coombes appeared on their behalf and asked for their discharge, the Attorney General appeared for the Crown.

HELP FOR THE SUFFERERS.—A Meeting was held in the City Council Chamber on Friday last, to devise means for aiding the people who are suffering from famine at the Red River Settlement.

EXPORTING OF FURNITURE.—We read in one of the morning papers that Messrs McEwan & Son, Cabinet makers, have received an order from a gentleman of prominent official position in New York for a set of Dining room furniture.

BERWICK.—The shop of one W. R. Burton, of Berwick, King's County, caught fire a few days ago from a match dropped, as was said, carelessly, but the fire was extinguished before much damage had been done.

Colin McDonald, a native of Cape Breton, while furling the flying jib on board the schr. John A. Cook, on the 26th ult., off Grand Bank, fell overboard and was drowned.

WINDSOR.—One day last week Mr. William Hancock, of St. John, N. B., when engaged in working in a lumber mill, at Windsor, had his arm drawn into the machinery, and badly battered.

FRUIT.—The first cargo of fruit from Malaga, arrived at this port on Saturday last in the brig Teazer owned by J. M. Watson.

TRURO.—A melancholy accident occurred here last week which resulted in the death of Mrs. E. O. Fitch, she having fallen out of the wagon, in which she was with her husband, and dislocated her neck.

PICTOU.—We understand that some parties are working at a seam of copper ore below Durham, on the West River, which gives indications of proving valuable.

THE LATE ROBBERIES.—A lad named John Murphy, about 17 years of age, has been arrested on suspicion of having committed the numerous robberies which have recently taken place in the central part of the city, and there is reason to believe that he is the guilty party.

APPOINTMENT.—His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, by the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to make the following appointment:—In the County of Annapolis: To be Custos Rotulorum—Hon. J. C. Troop, in the place of Silas L. Morse, Esq., resigned.

TURNIPS.—Alfred Munro writes from Milford to the Free Press, that on a piece of ground of about eighteen square rods, he took, a few days since, 103 bushels of huge turnips. Many of them weighing from nine to twelve pounds each. Pretty good.

THE CITY FATHERS.—The Abolitionist says: the Aldermen of Halifax do not forget, by their conduct at Council meetings, to remind their constituents that they (the Aldermen) are not fit for the position to which they have been elected.

RAILWAY ACCIDENT.—On Friday last as the afternoon train from Truro was stopping at Enfield, a wood train from Windsor Junction came up at a rapid rate and ran into the rear car, in which were some of the passengers.

A troublesome customer was taken to the Police Station a few days since. In consequence of the disturbance he made by kicking against the door his boots were taken off, on this being done a pocket book with upwards of \$2 was found in one of them.

ROBBERY.—The Bridgetown "Free Press" says "the notorious Lewis Davis, who has served several terms in the Penitentiary, was arrested on Tuesday for a robbery committed upon the store of Mr. Parker Dodge at Middleton. The goods were found on him. We understand that he knows who are the guilty parties, and threatens to expose a gang of fellow thieves."

RAILWAY BRIDGE.—The railway bridge across the Annapolis river is nearly completed, and the track laid upon it. The "Free Press" says it is, to all appearance, a substantial structure.

ANNAPOLIS RAILWAY DAMAGES.—The sessions of Kings County have appointed John B. Dickie, Esq., Custos Rotulorum of Colchester, as Commissioner, under an Act passed at the late session of the Legislature, to appraise the damages for land on the Windsor and Annapolis Railway.

FIRE AT NICTAUX FALLS.—The saw-mill, grist-mill and carding machine, owned by Mr. Samuel McKeown, at Nictaux Falls, were totally destroyed by fire one day last week. The loss is estimated at \$4,000. No insurance.

FATAL AFFRAY AT ELLERSHOUSE.—A row occurred in a tavern, in the village of Ellershouse on Thursday evening last, during which a man named Nathaniel Smith received a blow from the fist of a man named Alexander Ross, which proved fatal. Ross has been arrested.
