MEALY POTATOES.—It is a very common thing in the Spring to find strong, watery potatoes on the table, unless care has been taken to select and preserve them. A poor potato is the poorest article of food that can be had; as soon as they begin to sprout they will begin to grow poor and watery, the best part of the root going to the support of sprouts; hence, to have mealy, nice potatoes, it is necessary to keep them from exhausting themselves in this way. An exchange gives the following method of preventing the potatoes from sprouting: Take good, sound potatoes place them in a tub or barrel, and pour boiling water over them until the eyes are scalded so they will not sprout; dry the potatoes thoroughly in the sun, and put away in a box or in a cool, dry place. This will give a good, mealy potato all the time.

TOMATO CULTURE.—A correspondent of the *Gardener's Monthly* advocates a mode of rigid training of the tomato vine on trellises near walls facing south or east. With little trouble the vines can be tied to the lath or wires as they grow, and while space is thus economized it is a pleasing form of culture. The advantages are that the vines grow and bear from the earliest time that can be produced, until hard freezing weather comes in November. The fruit is finer flavored, more perfectly ripened, and is not subject to rot. By cutting the vines at the close of the season and hanging them with their load of fruit in a cool cellar, the latter will be retained in good eatable condition for a long time.

FATTENING CALVES.—A sensible practical farmer told us the other day that he had often noticed that calves would thrive better on milk that was not rich in butter, than on what was commonly called very rich milk. That is a fact in accordance with what we recently stated, that the nutritive element of milk reside chiefly in the caseine. If you have a cow that gives particularly rich milk and one that gives a quality poorer in butter, it is better in every way to feed the calf on the milk of the latter. The calf will thrive better and you'll get more butter from the milk of the first cow.—*Mass. Ploughman.*

CORN RUSK.—Take one pint of corn meal and scald it with one quart of milk, a half a teacup of warm lard or butter, a little salt, three eggs, yeast enough to make it raise; then stiffen it with wheat flour; let it stand and raise about three hours; then roll and let it raise again; bake it and eat warm.

Cream can be kept several days in hot weather without spoiling, by putting a tea cup of salt in a gallon of cream. So says an exchange.

If you want small potatoes hoe them frequently, so as to cause new tubers to set. If you don't, don't.

A dead horse is worth more for fertilizing purposes than three loads of common manure; and a dead dog more than a live one, on the average.

The best preventative of rust in wheat is silicate manures, like lime, ashes &c., and good drainage.

Wood ashes and common salt wet with water, will soak the cracks of a stove and prevent the smoke from escaping.

Sal-soda will bleach very white. One spoonful is enough for a kettle of clothes.

Save your suds for garden plants, or for garden yards when sandy.

Half a cranberry on a corn will soon kill it.
