HALIFAX ITEMS.

REPEAL.—A Public Meeting was held in Temperance Hall on Monday evening last for the purpose of advocating a Repeal of the Union. A very large audience was present and much enthusiasm exhibited. W. J. Stairs, Esq., occupied the chair. The speakers were R. J. Hartt, John Gibson, Patrick Power, A. G. Jones, E. M. McDonald, Esqrs., Dr. F. Tompkins, and Hon. Joseph Howe. Resolutions were passed, calling on the Nova Scotia Legislature to take the necessary steps to bring the subject of a Repeal of so much of the Act of Union as refers to the Province of Nova Scotia, before the Government, and the Parliament of Great Britain.

GOLD.—Messrs. Huse & Lowell had on exhibition at their office, on Saturday, several "bricks" of gold, weighing six hundred and sixty three ounces, and valued at upwards of twelve thousand dollars. This gold, we were informed, is the proceeds of one month's operations at the Wellington Company's Mines at Sherbrooke. The expenses incurred were something less than three thousand dollars, leaving a profit to the company on the month's operations of more than nine thousand dollars.—Chron.

In the Police Court on Saturday, a woman named Elizabeth Tyler was charged with stealing six sovereigns from a Mrs. Jackson, with whom she had been residing. A portion of the money was found in her possession, the balance having been expended. She was sentenced to pay a fine of \$40 or 90 days imprisonment.

A man named Shaw, one of the patients in the Lunatic Asylum, Dartmouth, who was admitted only a few days previous, committed suicide in that Institution on Monday.

B., in fourteen days, the quickest time ever made between the two ports by a sailing vessel. From Cape Sable to Cape Clear the time was ten days and nine hours.

MURDER AT KENNETCOOK.—We are informed that an affray occurred on Saturday last at a tavern in Kennetcook, between two men named Miller and Lee, resulting in the death of the latter. It appears that they were playing cards, and quarrelled, when Miller went into a room, got a gun, and deliberately aimed at Lee shot him dead.—Cit.

The St. John Globe of the 7th inst., says:—"The Eastern Express Company had as freight yesterday a lot of paper money of the nominal value of \$60,000 for the Bank of Montreal."

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has given the handsome donation of one hundred dollars towards the fund for the relief of the distressed fishermen on the coast.

The Eastern Chronicle learns that a man named Robert Reid was killed on Friday evening on the Acadia Mines Railway.
