Mexico.

Havana, Dec. 26.—A despatch from Mexico states that the revolution in Yucatan is assuming large proportions. Santa Anna had been proclaimed Dictator by the Revolutionists, and was expected hourly to arrive from Havana with men and a million of dollars. The fort and town of Sisal were in the hands of the rebels, but the port was blockaded by two Mexican gunboats. A number of officers who formerly served under the Emperor Maximilian had arrived at Sisal from Matamoros.

On the 16th an engagement took place between the Mexican gunboats and the batteries on the shore. The coast of Yucatan, in the vicinity of Sisal, was diligently watched to prevent the landing of troops coming from any foreign country to aid the rebellion. When the steamer left Vera Cruz on the 20th, the Mexican steamer *Tobasco* was ready to sail for Sisal on the next day with an expedition to establish the authority of the Mexican Government at Sisal. She had on board 500 or 600 men, and several pieces of artillery.

Santa Anna is in the City of Havana. Many ex-Imperialist officers have arrived here. They all seem to be busily engaged.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

THE FENIANS are becoming truly fiendish in their attempts at the destruction of human life. The telegram of the 24th inst., from London states that their latest effort was an attempt on the previous evening to destroy the Gas works at Glasgow. Attempts had been made the night before to destroy the Gas works at Warrington, near Liverpool; in both places the efforts were unsuccessful. The authorities in those cities are doubly watchful, and no further trouble is apprehended.

There is a wide-spread and ever increasing feeling favorable to the amelioration of the Irish, as the most effective means of suppressing Fenianism.

Dec. 26th.—Mr. Edward Thornton, the newly appointed Minister from Great Britain for Washington, will sail in a few days for America to enter upon the duties of his mission.

It is reported that the Sublime Porte has offered to the Cretans an autonomous Government and has named Prince Christian at its head.

A despatch from India announces the departure from Bombay of Gen Napier for Massorah to take immediate command of the British Expedition now advancing into the interior of Abyssinia.

London, Dec. 27.—Another of those fiendish outrages which have characterized the operations of the Fenians has just been perpetrated at Dublin. Telegrams from there received to-day have the following particulars. An unusual large number of letters have recently been received at the Post Office at Dublin, directed to prominent officials, and each one of those letters was loaded with explosive material designed to kill the person addressed. Several of the policemen of the city were horribly mangled when they opened them. It is not known how many of those dangerous missiles have been dispatched. Considerable excitement prevails both in Dublin and elsewhere through the country on the discovery of this, the last outrage. The authorities are actively engaged and will no doubt probe the matter to the bottom.

The London Times this morning has an editorial article on the Fenian question. It says that no less than thirty thousand special constables have been sworn in and are now serving in London. The writer calls on the provincial cities and towns to inculcate the precautionary measures of the Metropolis.

Dec. 29.—The Fenians seem to be unusually active all over the country. Nearly every hour in the day despatches are received by the authorities, announcing either a contemplated movement by the Brotherhood, or its actual occurrence.

Telegrams of quite a serious nature have been received from Cork, giving the details of another Fenian coup de main. Friday night, about midnight, a large party of men, with blackened faces, stormed the Martello Tower, near Cork. The guard of the Tower was overcome and scattered, and the victors hastily collected together a considerable quantity of arms and ammunition, and escaped with it without molestation.

The late operations of the Fenian has had the effect of rekindling the public excitement, which had nearly died out. Many improbable rumors are afloat, including one that a Fenian cruiser had been seen off the Irish coast, and was chased away by the British war vessels.

A man was arrested in London Friday evening, on a charge of having fired the fuse which caused the recent terrible explosion at Clerkenwell. From information in the hands of the authorities, it is believed that the true culprit has at last been captured.

ITALY.—Rome, Dec. 23.—The Holy Father in a speech congratulated his hearers on the defeat of Garibaldi and the preservation of the Holy See from danger.

The Italian Parliament by recent vote refused to pay the interest on the debt of Provinces formerly belonging to the States of the Church, which debt was assumed by Italy when those Provinces were annexed to the kingdom. The French Government has sent a despatch to Florence protesting against this action of the legislature.

Florence, 23.—The National Parliament will at an early day vote its decision in a solemn

manner, that the city of Rome belongs to Italy as the capital of the nation.

In consequence of the adverse vote at the conclusion of the debate in the House of Deputies last week, the members of the Cabinet have tendered their resignations to the King, but await the judgment of His Majesty.

The report that the French Expeditionary Corps remaining in Italy is to be reinforced, is confirmed this morning by the *Patrie* which states that the French Government has issued orders for the departure of 20,000 more troops from Civita Vecchia.

Dec. 27.—It is said that Gen. Manabrea has declared his intention to dissolve the National Parliament now in session, on the 15th prox., and make an appeal to the country, should another vote unfavorable to the ministry be adopted before that time.

Despatches received from Naples mention that the eruption of Mount Vesuvius is continually increasing in power and splendor. Immense shots of white, yellow and crimson flames rise hundreds of feet above the crater, and at night the Bay of Naples is lighted up for miles; lava is pouring down the mountain side in immense quantities, and large stones are occasionally thrown out from the mouth of the volcano; a deep rumble, like reverberating thunder is heard from time to time as in the bowels of the earth, and many of the people in the vicinity have left their homes, fearing an earthquake or some other calamity. No such eruption has probably occurred in Vesuvius for centuries, and the spectacle is regarded as one of the most magnificent and sublime ever witnessed in Nature.

DENMARK.—Copenhagen, Dec. 23.—The question of the transfer of the Danish West India Islands to the United States will be submitted to popular vote of the inhabitants of those Colonies in January.

AUSTRIA.—Vienna, Dec. 27.—By the re-arrangement of the Austrian Cabinet, Baron von Beust ceased to be President of the Council, but retains the post of Minister of Foreign Affairs which he has held all along in connection with his former position.

The Austrian frigate *Novaro* in command of Admiral Tegethoff, having on board the remains of the late Archduke Maximilian, arrived at Cadiz on Friday last.

SPAIN.—The Session of the Spanish Cortes commenced on Sunday last. In the usual speech from the Throne, Queen Isabella pledged the support of the Nation to the Pope, for the preservation of the Temporal Power.

FRANCE.—Paris, Dec. 27.—The *Maniteur* of to-day contains an official notice to the effect that the coupons of the Italian bonds will be paid.

The people have enjoined the Rothachids against paying the coupons on the Italian bonds in this city.

PRUSSIA.—Berlin, Dec. 28.—A general council of the Zollverein, in which all the States of North and South Germany are to be represented for the first time since the late war, will be held in this city in the month of March.

Prussia to-day commenced withdrawing her troops from all parts of Saxony except the fortress of Konigstein.

NEW ZEALAND.—All of the Imperial troops are now removed finally from New Zealand, and the colonists have henceforward to look after their own protection; the home government will no longer allow the "red coats" to keep watch and ward over the lives and interests of the settlers. As an immediate consequence of the removal of the troops the natives—that is the hostile portion of the natives—are beginning to muster and threaten. They are bent on having the confiscated territory of Walkaio restored to them peaceably if they can, but they are ready to fight for it otherwise. Matters don't look particularly pleasant to the colonists. Another war is among the probabilities of the immediate future.
