Dominion and Foreign News.

Ontario.

OTTAWA, Aug. 3.—The different Insurance Companies, have deposited about one million dollars in cash, one million in Canadian and British Securities, on the Treasury. The discount on American invoices for the week is 30 per cent. The minister of Customs has published the new Coasting regulations, in view of the former regulations of the Province of Canada.

West Indies.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—Advices from St. Domingo state, that 15,000 of President Baez's troops were badly beaten by the revolutionist, and their Commander, General Brigham, killed. The report of an English loan is a myth.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

ENGLAND.—London, July 27.—A report has been received by the Government that the British gunboat Pandora, of the African squadron, had landed some men at one of the Portuguese colonial stations, the coast of Guinea, and taken possession of the place by force of arms. But few particulars of the outrage are known; it is asserted that the Portuguese guard was disarmed and made prisoners, and the flag of Portugal was hauled down, and the British colors hoisted in its place. The Portuguese Government have dispatched two men of war from the Tagus to the scene of outrage.

In the House of Commons Mr. Kinglake put a question to Lord Stanley as to the condition of diplomatic relations between this country and Mexico. Lord Stanley replied that Mexico had broken off relations with England in consequence of recognition by the latter of the Empire of which Maximilian was the head. If the Republic should make overtures for a renewal, there would be no difficulty about it, but dignity and self-respect forbade that England should be solicitous of official intercourse between the two countries.

July 28.—The Court Circular announces that Queen Victoria will leave England on the 5th of August, going first to Paris, whence she will make a tour through France, Switzerland and Germany. It is expected that the Queen will return to England September 1st.

Political disturbances reported to have broken out again in Bulgaria. A despatch from Constantinople states the Turkish Government has ordered troops to that quarter to restore tranquility.

July 29.—The usual Banquet given on the conclusion of the Session of Parliament to the Ministers, occurred this evening. Mr. Disraeli in the course of remarks, touched upon the relations existing between Great Britain and the United States. He said with regard to the misunderstandings which have been so much dwelt on by the United States, every day leads to a better feeling upon them; and he expressed the opinion that their solution was near at hand, the result is only what can be expected from the natural good sense and feeling of two great and kindred nations.

July 30.—The decrease of specie in the Bank of England during last week was about £112,000.

July 31.—The Session of Parliament was prorogued to day. The Queen was not present and her speech was made by Royal Commission and read as usual by the Lord High Chancellor. It speaks of the foreign relations of Great Britain as most friendly and satisfactory, and says there is no reason to fear a war in Europe.—The Abyssinian expedition has vindicated the Honor of the Crown. Cessation of attempts at rebellion in Ireland renders the further use of the exceptional powers granted by the two Houses needless. The Queen thanks the Commons for the supplies voted for the Government and congratulates them upon the passage of the Irish and Scotch Reform Bills, the public School Bill, the Bill for the Purchase of the Telegraph wires throughout the kingdom, and others of a less important character. The speech also announces that a dissolution of Parliament will take place, in order that the people may reap the advantages of the more extensive system of

representation recently provided, confident of their fitness for the new duties, and that their voices will be for the perpetuation of that civil and religious freedom, which are secured by the constitution of the nation and the settlement of the realm.

All the prisoners who were arrested under the suspension of the Habeas Corpus in Ireland and detained without trial, have been discharged from custody.

Aug. 3.—A dreadful accident occurred in Manchester on Saturday night. During the regular performance at Lang's Music Hall an alarm of fire was raised, when the entire audience immediately rushed for the doors, completely blocking up the passage ways. The wildest excitement prevailed, and when at last order was restored by the repeated announcement that there was no fire, it was found that no less than 23 persons, mainly women and children, had been crushed to death in the stampede, and a large number of persons had limbs broken and were otherwise injured.

SPAIN, July 28.—Advices from Spain report that the Government has distributed Troops throughout the Province of Catalonia, and that under the operation of Martial Law and through the efficiency of a flying column of military all attempts at rising have been suppressed.

Madrid, July 30.—The Queen refuses to accept the resignation of Admiral Muniz, the Commander of the Spanish fleet in American waters.

July 31.—The pending political troubles in Spain have resulted in a Ministerial crisis. It is understood that the distinguished liberal statesman, Espartero has been summoned to form a new Cabinet, and has gone to Madrid for that purpose. Discontent continues to prevail in Spain and threatens to break out into armed insurrection at any moment. Disaffection is also apparent among the officers of the fleet.

RUSSIA.—Under the preliminary arrangements for peace made with Bokhara, the Russian troops are to leave the country at once the Khan paying the Russian Government half a million silver roubles as indemnity for the expenses of the war.

The Yacht Race was a poor affair. Three yachts started. The Prince of Wales' Cup was won by the Squirrel, owned by J. M. Watson.

CIVIC.—A Delegation consisting of His Worship the Mayor, Aldermen Nash and Blackader left Halifax on Saturday last to attend the Portland Railway Convention. Alderman Dunbar is the acting Mayor.

The City Council have refused to allow the Horse Railway Company to lay a track through the North end of Hollis Street to connect with the existing line at the Province Building.

Early on Sunday evening a serious disturbance took place in City Street, and we regret to learn that a soldier of the 30th Regt., who was present was very seriously injured.

An unfortunate woman, an inmate of the Lockup house, attempted to commit suicide on Saturday evening last by hanging herself.

Rev. Dr. Crawley preached in the Dartmouth Baptist Chapel on Sunday last.

A bar of gold valued at \$5400 was shipped to England in the R. M. S. City of Cork yesterday by Messrs. A. McLeod & Co.

Mr. Charles Grant, of the Customs Department, had his arm broken on Thursday by being knocked from the gangway of the ship Assam Valley.

In Montreal on Friday last, a daughter of Dr. Matheson, a Presbyterian clergyman, was drowned while bathing.

THE CROPS.—Encouraging accounts are given of the appearance of the crops in Cape Breton, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick. The hay crop in nearly all parts of this province it is feared will be far below the average.
