

OUR CITY SCHOOLS .- Some members of the City Council have prepared a bill, now before the Houses of Legislature, for placing the Schools in Halifax on a Youndation differing lating to the candidate's examination. materially from that they now occupy. The management, it proposes, shall be vested in twelve Commissioners, eight appointed by the City Council and four instead of the whole, as at present, by the Governor in Council.

Clause 4 provides a scale on which ratepayers are to be assessed for school purposes. In the published draft of the bill it stood as follows :
