Dominion and Foreign News.

OTTAWA, June 11.—Hon. Mr. Howland to be Lieut-Governor of Ontario from first of next month. Rose goes to England to negotiate Intercolonial Railway Loan. Route will be sent home for approval immediately. No doubt Major Robinson's line will be adopted. Lord Monck left yesterday morning for Quebec, not to return again to Ottawa. Orders will shortly be issued for the concentration of the Royal Battalion at respective head quarters, for the purpose of performing their annual drill. The military camps are situated at all exposed points.

MONTREAL, June 9. Detective Cullen was shot this morning while taking a prisoner named Charles Gardner, to station house. Gardner was supposed to be connected with an extensive band of robbers in the States, and was arrested here on information from the U. S. authorities. Cullen will probably die. Two accomplices of Gardner were also arrested, and bonds to a large amount were found in their possession.

TORONTO, June 12.—The "Globe" professes to have information on authority beyond dispute, that the Fenian movement upon Canada has actually commenced. It says that forces are being gradually concentrated at Buffalo and other points. Forty Fenians went from Port Huron on Tuesday. The raid is possible any day after the 20th inst. The "Globe" calls on the Government to order into the field at once the whole Volunteer and Regular force of the country.

The Canadian Government has received assurances from the government at Washington, that no Fenian raid will be permitted, and that the Fenian preparations are not of such magnitude as that they should excite alarm.

The deputy heads of the various departments at Ottawa have been formally gazetted. They are the same gentlemen that have been acting in that capacity since July last. The Hon. Mr. Gray, of New Brunswick, is also gazetted as Arbitrator in connection with the debts of Ontario and Quebec.

New Brunswick.

The Fredericton Seminary held its Annual examination and Anniversary exercises on the 3rd and 4th inst., which were of a very satisfactory character. The number of students during the past year has been large. Several are in preparation for a College course, and some for the ministry. The oration to the Alumni was delivered by Rev. W. S. McKenzie.

The Railway Cars shot over a fifty feet bank on Friday week, on the Western Extension, about eight or nine miles from St. John, on the part of the road which is being constructed by Ross & Yorton. The brakes gave way, the heavily laden cars could not be stopped, and the men in charge had to jump for their lives. It was a work of no small toil and labor to recover the scattered remains of the cars.

An accidental explosion occurred on the St. John Lunatic Asylum grounds, by which a man named Hopper, was so seriously injured that he died shortly after.

A man named Alexr. Combie fell dead while ringing a church bell at Chatham, N. B., the other day.

A man named Grievous Bonnel committed suicide in Fredericton, on Sunday night, by swallowing arsenic.

The United States.

NEW YORK, June 5.—Panama dates are of the 28th May. The Presidential election was quietly progressing.

Bolivan advices state that two hundred persons die daily at Lima from Yellow fever, business is suppressed in consequence.

Capt. Blakely, the inventor of the Blakely gun, and wife, and several prominent merchants, were among the victims.

The United States Consul at Janhez had a difficulty with the authorities, and was calabossed.

The city of Washington elected a Republican Mayor and two colored men to City Council.

June 9th.—Advices from Mexico represent the condition of affairs in the interior as very much demoralized. Society is chaotic, and crime and violence everywhere prevailed.

June 10.—Steamship Nevada, hence for Havana, was totally wrecked off Cape Hatteras. Only one life lost. Vessel and cargo valued at \$400,000.

June 11.—The Yellow Fever is raging at Nicaragua and in Peru. The French Minister at Lima and the Peruvian minister of Foreign Affairs have both died of the fever.

The condition of Mexico does not improve, and it is thought that another civil war is imminent.

June 12.—Congress has voted to keep the Freedman's bureau in operation another year. Rumors of Cabinet changes are current, but lack good foundation. Money market more stringent.

June 13.—Congress yesterday passed a bill admitting the Southern States lately in rebellion to representation in Congress.

Despatches from Buffalo say the sensational report from Canada about Fenian invasion probably originated with Canadian speculators interested in contracting for supplying the troops.

Hon. Reverly Johnson, Senator from Maryland, has been confirmed U. S. minister to London.

A joint resolution passed Congress requesting the President to interpose with the British Government for the release of Father McMahon, now confined in a Canadian Jail for complicity with Fenians.

June 15.—Gold steady and firm at 140. The principal demand is from the trade with which to pay duties and purchase foreign exchange. Sales on speculation amount to very little.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

ENGLAND.—London, June 8.—Chief Justice Cockburn states that the charge delivered by Judge Blackburn to the Grand Jury which recently refused to bring in a bill of indictment against ex-Governor Eyre of Jamaica, is contrary to the opinion of the majority of the Court of Queen's bench.

June 9.—In the House of Commons this evening, Sir Harry Vernon made some enquiries of the Government concerning measures for opening territory in British North America for settlement. Mr. Adderly, Under Secretary for the Colonial Department, replied that the early colonization of the lands from Lake Superior to the Pacific coast was desirable, but so long as negotiations for settlement with the Hudson's Bay Company were pending no steps could be taken by the Home Government in that direction.

June 12.—The Directors of the Atlantic Telegraph Company declared a dividend payable on the 1st of July, of 6 per cent on preference stock and 3 per cent on original stock.

June 15.—The sultan and his New Cabinet are maturing a plan to permit persons of foreign birth residing in Turkey, to legally hold property, which right is to be guaranteed by treaties with foreign powers.

It is announced that Ex-Governor Eyre, of Jamaica, will contest the seat of John Stuart Mill, member of Parliament from Westminster, London, in the coming elections.

FRANCE.—Paris, June 9.—Baron Stackelburg, the Russian minister presented his credentials, and had a formal reception at Court yesterday. In his remarks he hoped for a continuation of friendly relations between France and Russia on the basis of mutual interests. The Emperor Napoleon made a pacific reply. He reciprocates the expression by Baron Stackelburg, and thought the appointment of an Envoy personally so popular in France was a pledge of amity.

June 11.—The *Moniteur* says the Czar of Russia has made a proposal to the Emperor Napoleon, that Russia and France unite in an effort to induce all civilized nations to abstain from the use of Torpedoes, and all explosive projectiles in time of war. The *Moniteur* adds that this humane proposal meets with the approval of the Emperor, who, however, thinks it may still be necessary to employ torpedoes for defensive purposes.

The Bank of France returns show a decrease of three million francs.

June 12. It is not proposed by the Czar to do away with the use of all kinds of explosive projectiles, but only with rifle and musket bullets which bury themselves in the flesh and then explode. It is the disease of this murderous invention which received the unqualified approval of the Emperor Napoleon.

Napoleon is examining into a scheme for bridging the English Channel, devised by M. Boutel. The plan is to make a railroad bridge to rest on floats.

AUSTRIA.—June 11, P. M.—Prince Michael, reigning Prince of Servia, was assassinated in Belgrade yesterday. While walking through a public park, last evening, he was suddenly attacked by three assassins armed with revolvers. He was accompanied by his cousin and a daughter of the latter, with his usual attendants. The assassins directed their fire promiscuously at the royal party. At the first shot the Prince fell and expired immediately. The cousin of the Prince was also hit and died; a few minutes afterwards his daughter received a severe flesh wound, but was not dangerously wounded. One or two of the valets were also wounded. The assassins were recognized as three brothers. One was promptly taken while hurrying from the scene of the tragedy; and it is thought that the others will not be able to escape. The assassination produced profound excitement throughout the country.

Dispatches from Belgrade represent that the excitement prevailing in that city and throughout the Principality, is intense and unabated. No outbreak, however, has occurred in consequence. Two of the assassins of Prince Michael have been arrested. It has been ascertained

that it was not three brothers who fired the fatal shot, but a father and his two sons. One of the latter is still at large, but it is believed he cannot escape.

PRUSSIA.—Berlin, June 10.—North German Confederation proposes to the great powers of Europe and America, the adoption of an international Treaty to guarantee absolute security from the seizure of private property upon the high sea in time of war.

The Prussian Government is about to commence works for the extension and strengthening of the fortifications of Cologne.

GREECE, June 9.—A letter from Athens says the the Greek Government has just received certain dispatches which is a virtual recognition of Crete as a part of the Greek nation. This event is almost sure to lead to a war between Greece and Turkey to be followed by a general European war, with France Austria and Great Britain leagued together to support Turkey.

JAPAN, June 9.—A Japan letter states that stringent orders in reference to attacks of foreigners have been issued, making high officials so offending, liable to decapitation and loss of caste.

The envoy plenipotentiary of the Mikado had orders to raise Yeddo to the ground.

Albro, & Co., and others.—There can be no doubt that with the building of the Intercolonial and the Windsor and Annapolis Railroads, this company will be a very desirable one for the general public.

EDUCATION.—J. F. L. Parsons, Esq., Principal of the Brunswick Street School, has been appointed Inspector of Schools for Halifax County.

CONFERENCE.—The Wesleyan Conference meets in Fredericton next week. Rev. Mr. Punsbon may be expected in Halifax early in July.

CONVENTION.—The Annual Convention of the Young Men's Christian Association of the United States and British North America will be held at Detroit, Michigan, on 24th inst. Representatives will attend from the Halifax and some of the country Associations.

GEOLOGY.—Rev. Dr. Honeyman has left Sydney to begin the geological survey of the Province, ordered by the Dominion House of Commons. The work of the survey is to be conducted under the superintendance of Professor Logan.

DIRECTOR.—The hon. J. C. Troop has been appointed a Director of the Windsor and Annapolis Railroad.

RAILWAY.—Judging from the progress of the work on the Windsor and Annapolis Railway, the Bridgetown *Free Press* thinks the iron horse will be careering through the valley before winter sets in.

GOLD.—Two ingots of gold, weighing 99 ounces, the result of the labor of twenty-five men for six weeks, at Strawberry hill, Tangier, have been brought to town by W. T. Townsend, Esq. The recent weather has materially interfered with mining operations.
