The Court of General Session of Queens Co., closed their business on Saturday the 16th. The Grand Jury recommended that no licenses for the sale of intoxicating liquors be granted.

It is proposed to organize a joint stock company in this city, to start a line of omnibuses similar to those used in London. Large carriages, capable of containing eighteen passengers inside, and twenty two outside, will be used to connect with the railway trains; while smaller ones are to be used for general travel. It is proposed to fix the fare at five cents, and the shares will be placed at a low price, to induce the public generally to engage in the enterprise.—Citizen.

**THE RAILWAY BRIDGE AT WINDSOR.**—The Mail of Saturday last says:—"A number of real estate owners on both sides of the Avon River, above the bridge, are bestirring themselves in the matter of the Railway Bridge. They are anxious to have a solid embankment or abutment across the river instead of a bridge; and have held a meeting at Falmouth to consider the matter. It is represented that such a work would make 2000 acres above the abutment, and would be no detriment to the river for shipping purposes."

We long ago expressed an opinion that this would be the more economical mode of getting across the Avon, but supposed those on the spot better acquainted with the engineering difficulties. The Mail adds "Whether the present time is not too late to consider the matter, as arrangements for a pier bridge have been completed it seems some time ago, we know not; but a strong effort is being made to advocate the proposal, and get it a hearing in the proper quarter."

**GRANVILLE.**—We are pleased to announce that Messrs. Pickles, Wiley & Co., have established a Boot and Shoe Factory, on a large scale at Granville Ferry. We understand that by a large outlay of capital they have erected suitable buildings, have procured a heavy stock of materials, and are prepared to carry in the business, in which they are engaged with energy.
