On Friday, the 17th, the Prince and Princess of Wales were entertained at a banquet, given by the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland. There was a large number of invited guests present on the occasion.

ENGLAND.—London, April 13.—Viscount Cranborne, Marquis of Salisbury and Secretary of State for India under Lord Derby is dead.

April 14.—Thirty Thousand Volunteers were reviewed at Portsmouth yesterday, an immense crowd being present from London, Portsmouth, and the country around, to witness the display.

The Abyssinian Expedition, April 16.—It was rumored to-day that advices were received from Abyssinia to the effect that the British captives at Magdala had been released by King Theodore, and that the object of the invading force having been attained, the war was over.

Midnight.—A great political mass meeting of the Liberal party was held at St. James' Hall to-night. Every available portion of the hall was crowded to repletion. The platform was occupied by a large number of the Liberal members of Parliament, and by other prominent gentlemen of the Party.

April 17.—It is reported that General Garibaldi has left Capri and gone to Naples. The rumor causes some uneasiness as to the object of the General's movements.

The British Post Office Department is about to send out to the United States Mr. A. Trollope to arrange the details of postal convention in that country.

The hostility which has for a long time existed between Baron Von Bueberg, the Russian ambassador at Paris, and Baron Megendorfer who formerly held the same position, culminated in a duel yesterday P. M., at a secluded spot near Munich.

THE DIS-ESTABLISHMENT OF THE PROTESTANT CHURCH IN IRELAND.—The following are the resolutions adopted by the Imperial Parliament by a majority in opposition to the Government:—

- 1. That in the opinion of the House it is necessary that the Established Church of Ireland should cease to exist as an establishment; due regard being had to all personal interests, and to all individual rights of property.

In 1864 the total income of the Irish Church amounted to £586,428 8s. 8d.—upwards of half a million of pounds. Of this sum the twelve Irish bishops received £55,110 2s. 9d. The rest was divided amongst the 1510 clergymen—averaging about £330 a year.
