When the gales come through the trees, the yellow leaves trail like sparks at night behind the flying engine. The woods are thinner, so that we can see the heavens plainer, as we lie dreaming on the yet warm moss by the singing spring. The days are calm; the nights are tranquil. The year's work is done. Keeping Poultry in Orchards,

Some farmers make it a practice to keep their poultry in their orchards from early in the spring until cold weather sets in, and they find it pays them for so doing. A picket fence should be built around the orchard high enough to prevent their flying over, with a suitable house, or shed, in one corner of the yard to shelter them at night. Thus situated, the poultry will thrive and prosper, keeping themselves in good condition, and the increase in eggs will be greatly augmented, and their usefulness and value be enhanced to their owner at least, on account of the thousand myriads of insects which they naturally destroyed.

The immense number of insects and worms that are injurious to the trees and fruit, which fowls will destroy, when kept within an enclosure in this way, will more than repay the cost and labor of building the fence. By keeping them enclosed in this manner a large number of fowls may be retained in an orchard, and the continual scratching which is done by them will prove advantageous,

both to the soil and to the tree themselves. We do not offer these suggestions as being practicable in all cases; but it has proven itself profitable to confine fowls in the manner as above stated .- Rural American.

WINTERING CATTLE IN QUEBEC .- The Mon treal Witness says that the scarcity of fooder in Ontario, as compared with the greater part of Quebec, has induced speculators to buy up. droves of young cattle in the western province and bring them here to winter. A drove of of three hundred head lately passed through the city in one day across the river to pasture. This importation is going on to a considerable extent, and cattle in large numbers are driven south for the same purpose.
