

candidates. A member of the Government took charge of the Separate-School Bill in the Legislature, but it was left an open question, and one of his colleagues moved to throw out the Bill. The majority against it was large—possibly all the larger because the people had warned their representatives by petition that they did not court Separate-Schools. These petitions came from all parts of the Province and were numerous signed—showing that already the popular feeling for the Common-School system is very strong.

The Nova Scotians will do well to adhere firmly to the decision now arrived at. Let the people instruct their public men that they must preserve the Common-School system at all hazards. Let no political emergency tempt them to break it up and make way for inferior schools under sectarian control. The Roman Catholics of Nova Scotia have no doubt been persuaded to support the demand for Separate Schools, and they may think it a hardship that their request is refused. But they will find in the end that refusing Separate-Schools the Legislature consulted their real interests. They will find that the Common-School system secures their children better education than the other, and leaves their religious faith just as safe.

THE FREEMASONS.—A grand Celebration of the Freemasons took place on Thursday last for the purpose of manifesting the union, under one Grand Lodge, of the various Lodges which have heretofore been divided. About six hundred walked in procession from the Masonic Hall through several streets, bearing the regalia and symbols of the craft, to St. Paul's Church where the Rev. D. C. Morse, of Bridgewater, preached from the words, "Let brotherly love continue." On returning the procession reformed, and passed through the streets northward and returned again to the Hall.

In the evening a Grand Banquet was held in the Skating Rink. We understand that viands rich and rare, and champagne in abundance were supplied. Loyal Toasts were given and Speeches indicative of good-fellowship occupied the evening, and appears to have afforded satisfaction to all concerned.

STRAWBERRIES are making their appearance in our markets not yet however of first quality.

ROBBERY.—Wm. Howe, Esq., Barrister, of this city was robbed of his gold watch, money and some other articles one morning last week while in bed in a house in Falmouth, Hants County. The robbery was perpetrated by a man named Wm. Johnson who was employed as a farm servant by the family with whom Mr. Howe was stopping. The robber has been arrested and committed for trial.

GOVERNOR MUSGRAVE.—Anthony Musgrave, Esq., at present Governor of Newfoundland, has been appointed Governor of British Columbia, in the place of Governor Seymour, deceased.

VISIT OF THE GOVERNOR GENERAL.—Sir John and Lady Young will leave Ottawa about the 1st of July for Quebec. They will remain there during that month, and about the 1st of August will leave for Halifax. After spending a short time in Nova Scotia, Sir John and Lady Young will go West, and visit Toronto and other Western cities in Ontario about the end of August.

YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION CONVENTION.—The Annual Convention of the Young Men's Christian Associations of North America will be held at Portland on the 14th of July and the three following days.

BRITISH TEMPLARS.—The annual session of the Grand Lodge of British Templars will open in the town of Lunenburg on Tuesday, July 13th.

APPOINTMENTS.—His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, by the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to appoint Hon. Samuel Chipman, D. M. Dickie, Esq., M. P. P., and John L. Brown, Esq., to be commissioners for carrying out the provisions of the Act, passed 12th June, 1869, to provide for the payment of damages assessed for Railway purposes in the county of Kings, and to appoint assessors to assess such damages.

SALMON has been brought into the Halifax market in large quantities during the past week. It is exported packed in ice. A large number of boxes have been sent to Boston and New York. The Steamer Oriental in her last trip took 2700 lbs. to the United States.

LOYALTY.—The observance of the holidays—the Queen's birthday last week, and that of Her Majesty's coronation day on Monday last, were observed this year with undiminished manifestations of loyalty in Halifax. The bunting was displayed on a large number of private houses, as well as from the public buildings.

EARLY VEGETABLES.—Mr. C. Fritze, of this place, presented us with some green peas yesterday; he has had tomatoes in bloom this last four days.—Wolfville Acadian, June 20th.

A police force has been organized in Amherst. Cyrus Black, Esq., has been appointed police magistrate for the district.

Coal is being sent in large quantities from Pictou to Montreal.

The Saturday Mail is to be revived under the title of the Windsor Mail.

THUNDER STORM AT YARMOUTH.—The Yarmouth Herald reports that during a thunder storm which occurred a few days ago, the lightning struck the Light House, doing considerable damage to the building, which it shook throughout, starting some of the timbers, boards and shingles, and breaking some of the glass in the windows, but without injuring the lantern. The lightning also struck the residence of Mrs. Jacob Utley, at the southern end of the town, damaging a chimney, and scattering fragments of it on a bed in which were Mrs. Utley's daughter (Mrs. Lyman Kelly) and child, breaking a lamp in another room, upsetting a stove, splitting a post, and shattering some panes of glass in one of the windows.—Fortunately none of the inmates were injured.

THE RIFLE MATCH.—The Ottawa Times officially announces "the Council of the Dominion Rifle Association have changed the place for holding the annual rifle match for this year from Halifax to Toronto. The match will, therefore, take place at Toronto, commencing on the 17th of August."

P. E. ISLAND TELEGRAPH CABLE.—On Saturday the laying of the new telegraph cable between Cape Tormentine, N. B., and Cape Traverse, P. E. I., was successfully accomplished, and telegraphic communication with the Island, which had been suspended for about a year has been resumed.

A Pictonian who has resided in different parts of the United States, writing from Nevada State to a friend in this place, says in reference to the exodus from this Province:—"Industrious men can do just as well, if not better, in Pictou, than in any part of the States in which I have worked. I would not advise any person to leave Pictou to seek employment here."

KING'S COLLEGE, WINDSOR.—At the annual general meeting of the Associated Alumni of King's College, Windsor, held in the College Hall, on Wednesday last the Hon. M. B. Almon, Frederick Allison, and Rev. Mr. Ambrose, were elected Governors of the College. Benjamin Curran, D. C. L., was re-elected President of the Alumni and Dr. Gossip, Rev. Mr. Armstrong, and Rev. Mr. Bowman, members of the Executive Committee. A good deal of other business was transacted, and the following day (Thursday) the Exceenia was celebrated with the usual ceremonies.—Col.

ACCIDENTS.—On Monday 21st Inst., a man named John Puday, met with a severe accident while working at the spike driver near Greenwich; some portion of the upper gear became detached, and a bar of iron fell and striking him on the head fractured his skull. He was brought to Wolfville on a "trolley," and medical aid called in. Hopes are now entertained of his recovery.

On Wednesday evening a man met his death by falling from the staging of the Railway Bridge at Hantsport.

AGED MEN.—The Pictou Standard states that a respectable inhabitant of W. Branch, River John, named William Murray, aged 101 years, walked to the town of Pictou last week from his home, a distance of 18 miles. He performed the journey from sunrise to 9 1/2 o'clock, a.m. Having transacted his business in town, he started for home, quite fresh and vigorous to walk back again. Last winter the same old gentleman threshed 325 bushels of oats with the flails besides attending a large stock of cattle.

We ourselves a few days since saw an old gentleman at Mahone Bay upwards of 102 years of age.
