

waiting further expression from Parliament and Congress commits to an indefinite postponement.

May 19.—The Anniversary meeting, of the Peace Society was held to-day. Resolves were adopted, regretting rejection, by United States Senate, of Alabama Treaty; hoping, if the Statesmen of the two countries are unable to grapple with the emergency, that the reason and christianity of the two great Anglo-Saxon nations may interpose to prevent a war, and rejoicing in the activity and earnestness of the Peace Societies of America.

May 21.—Sir Francis Head has sent a letter to the London "Times" on Alabama claims question, in which he cites action of United States Government in the Canada rebellion of 1837 as a precedent for England's course.

May 22.—The new duplicate telegraph line to connect London and Valencia, was completed on Friday. The two Atlantic cables are in perfect working order. Hereafter one cable will be used exclusively for sending despatches from Valencia, and the other for receiving.

IRELAND.—A serious riot occurred in Tralee, Ireland, on Tuesday the 11th, commencing in a fight between mobs, when the police interfered and were compelled to fire on the crowd.

The Archbishop of Cashel has written a Pastoral letter deprecating the recent outrages in Tipperary; and counselling the Irish people to trust to the English Government for an adjustment of their wrongs.

May 24.—One of the greatest meetings ever assembled in Ireland met at Belfast on Saturday, to protest against the disestablishment of the Irish Church. It is estimated that nearly 20,000 people were present.

FRANCE.—Paris, May 17.—The elections in Paris and vicinity are likely to result favorably to the Opposition, but the general result throughout the country leaves little hope for that party.

Negotiations for the Conference between France and Belgium have been completed.

May 21.—The elections continue to be attended with more or less disorder. Since the 12th inst., one hundred and forty-nine persons have been arrested in Paris, for creating political disturbances, and of these only seventeen have been discharged.

May 24.—The general elections for members of the French Corps Legislatif commenced on Sunday. Voting in Paris progresses quietly, and reports from all parts of the country show that tranquility prevails.

TALKING SPANISH.—The Empress of the French often speaks and writes French incorrectly. Whenever she gets excited she uses a great many Spanish words in her conversation, and when really angry she will, at least, only speak Spanish.

SPAIN.—May 17.—The Spanish Cortes have agreed to article 32 of the Constitution declaring Sovereignty is essentially in the nation, from which all power emanates; amendments requiring that the King be a native of Spain, and that he be elected by plebiscitum, were rejected by majority.

Madrid, May 21.—Article 32nd of the constitution, declaring that all powers emanate from the nation, was adopted in the Spanish Cortes to-day by acclamation.

GERMANY.—May 20.—The elections recently held in Germany, have resulted in favor of uniting North and South Germany.

EGYPT.—Alexandria, May 18.—The Viceroy of Egypt sailed from this port yesterday. He will make a tour through Europe.

AUSTRALIA.—New York, May 20.—Australian advices to March 20, are to the effect that a fearful mortality existed among the flocks of sheep in the Colony of Victoria, caused by drought.

CHINA.—May 23.—The difficulty with the Chinese Government, arising out of the persecution of the Christians in the North, has been settled.

The latest despatch from the British Legation at Peking states that the Mandarin who countenanced the persecution has been removed from office.
