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BUTTER-MAKING.

It is impossible to produce prime butter when it comes out of the churn salvy. It always should be in globules or particles at least as coarse as mustard seed, and not hardly stuck together. Remove it directly from the churn into cool water. It will float apart so that the water will come in contact with most of the milk, and separate it from the butter. In the operation of taking it out of the churn, gather it gently with a ladle, pres-ing the mass slightly together, and pour off the water. But be careful not to work it too much, as there is more butter injured by being worked too much and improperly, than by not being worked enough. Add a little salt, which will help to extract the milk, and toughen the grain of the butter; then put on more water, and work it a little by pressing lightly and turning it over; at all times avoid, as far as possible, all friction, for that will make butter salvy ; and when once salvy, no after treatment can restore it. Butter should never be allowed to come in contact with any person's hands, for they will make it oily and stickly, even in cold weather, and with utmost care. The water should now be drained off, and at least one of ounce of fine Ashton salt added to a pound of butter, if intended for long keeping. It should be worked this time only just enough to mix in the salt. Set it in a cool place, for a short time, where it will harden and a portion of the salt dissolve, when it may be worked a little more, mixing the fresh and salted portions together; then drain it again and allow it to stand until next morning, when it will be firm and yellow. Then it should be worked until it is a uniform mass, and until there is no buttermilk in the pickle, or brine, which the salt has made. It will now be in condition for packing or for the market. When properly manufactured and packed, butter can be kept for years in good preservation. - N. Eng. Farmer.





CHEAP STUMP MACHINE.

Mr. H. Marsh, Hudson, N. H., says, in the Mirror and Farmer, that he has made and used a stump machine constructed as follows: Take three pieces of commonjoists, put them together in form like the common harrow, letting the tapering or forward ends lap by each other some six inches, making a place for the chain to rest in. Cut off the roots at any distance you please from the stump, place the machine on one side of the stump, tapering end up, hitch the chain on the opposite side, and pass it over the machine; then hitch a good yoke of oxen thereto, and you will see the stump rise. He has cleared about three acres in this way.

UTILIZING WAR MATERIAL IN TIME OF PEACE.

The Society of Agriculture of the Drome has addressed to the Emperor a letter in which it describes the suffering state of agriculture in consequence of the continued decrease in the number of labourers, and requests his Majesty to place, in time of peace, at least one quarcer of the effective strength of garrisons at the disposal of agriculturists during the summer months. KEEPING BULBS AND TUBERS THROUGH THE WINTER .- A correspondent of the Rural World, after severe losses, has experimented in this matter. He buried in sand, in a cellar free from frost, dahlia and gladioli, and also placed a like quantity of the same in barrels, as he would potatoes, with ventilation at the bottom, and set the same on hanging shelves in the cellar. All came out in good condition in the Spring. Not one in a thousand was, lost. Those in sand were very much sprouted and made splendid early-flowering plants.




