On the recommendation of the Honorable the Acting Minister of Inland Revenue, and under an Act in virtue of the authority conferred by the 10th Section of the Act 31 Vic. Cap. 51, intitled: "An Act for better securing the payment of the duty imposed on Tobacco manufactured in Canada."

REGULATIONS.

- 1. All persons who had in their possession on the 22nd day of May, in the present year and who still have in possession any quantity exceeding ten pounds of Raw or Leaf Tobacco imported into or grown in Canada before the said twenty-second day of May, shall, on or before the First day of February next ensuing, render to the Collector of Inland Revenue, for the Division in which the holder of such Tobacco resides, a true account and return thereof, stating: a. The quantity in pounds. b. The place where it is stored. c. The Port of Entry at which it was imported and the date of such importation of foreign origin. d. If grown in Canada, the place where it was grown with. e. Such further evidence as may be necessary for establishing to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Inland Revenue, that the said Tobacco was in the possession of the person making the return on or before the said twenty-second day of May.

INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY.

The Commissioners appointed to construct the Intercolonial Railway give Public Notice that the intend to let 4 sections of the line at once.

Sections Nos 1 and 2 embrace about 40 miles from a junction with the Grand Trunk Railway, near Riviere du Loup, and each section will be about 20 miles in length.

Section No. 3 will be about 26 miles in length and lies between the East side of Restigouche River to near Dalhousie in New Brunswick.

Section No. 4 will be about 24 miles in length and lies between Amherst and River Philip in Nova Scotia.

Plans and profiles with specifications and terms of contract will be exhibited at the offices of the Commissioners in Ottawa, Riviere du Loup, Dalhousie, St. John and Halifax, on and after the 11th January, 1869, and sealed Tenders addressed "To the Commissioners of the Intercolonial Railway," will be received at their office in Ottawa up to 4 o'clock on the 8th February, 1869.
