RAILWAY MATTERS.—It is the intention, we are informed, of the Railway authorities to have a Freight Depot in Halifax to be located in some central part of the city where the horse-cars could be employed to bring all freight where it might be handy for produce to be taken to the markets, or to the wharves, for the purpose of exportation. If this were done, one great cause of complaint would be removed.

We received last week a sheet of a Comparative Statement, shewing the rates at which the various kinds of farmer's produce is carried on several different lines of railway in Nova Scotia and other countries. It appears from this that the charges in many of them are even higher than here.

THE PROVINCIAL TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION are holding their annual Convention in this city. About fifty persons were present at the opening on Monday evening. The President A. McP. Patterson, Esq., of Lower Horton, delivered the Inaugural Address touching on the present state of educational matters in this province. At the close he referred to the subject of Inspection and Inspectors, and brought forward, Mr. George's pamphlet in reference to his late dismissal, endorsing its statements. Some discussion followed. The Convention adjourned about 10 o'clock to meet yesterday morning at 10 o'clock.

It is expected that the Convention will continue in session till this evening, or possibly till to-morrow morning, as there are several matters of importance to be brought up for consideration.

The attendance was considerably increased yesterday. T. H. Rand, Esq., the Superintendent of Education, addressed the Association in the afternoon. We go to press too early to notice the subject of his Address.

PORT HOOD, C. B. Two men were a few days since pretending to fight a duel, each of them having pistols. They appear to have been drinking, one named Shea actually fired and killed the other one named Murphy. There appears to have been no intention in either to do the other injury. Shea appears in great distress at the act he has committed.

MISSION HOUSE IN BARRACK STREET.—Mr. Edward Jost has erected a large substantial brick edifice on Barrack Street, to be used as a general City Mission House. It is now completed and will be opened this Wednesday evening, at past 7 o'clock, by a Public Meeting. The building we learn has cost \$12,000. This is a highly creditable and praise-worthy appropriation made by one of our prosperous business men. Mr. Jost has long been much interested in the religious condition of those who do not regularly attend the worship of God, and now gives good evidence of this interest, and his desire to benefit them.
