Lord Broughton has left his papers to the British Museum, with strict injunctions that they are not to be opened till the year 1900, and that even then they are not to be published except with the consent of the reigning sovereign. Although the title of Lord Broughton is extinct, still the baronetcy of Hobhouse remains; the present baronet, Sir Charles Hobhouse, is a judge at Calcutta.

EDUCATION IN HOLLAND.—Dutch education has been mostly the growth of the present Century, and is principally owing to the establishment, in 1784, by a Baptist minister, of the "Society for the promotion of the Public Weal," which, commencing on a very humble scale, now numbers 200 branch societies and 14,000 members. THE FRANKLIN EXPEDITION.—A party, vouched reliable, writes to the Bulletin, from San Buenaventura, that a document was found on the beach at that place, on the 30th of August, much mutilated, which requested the finder to forward it to the Secretary of the Admiralty at London, or to the British Consul nearest to that port. It was written in six commercial languages: The margin and every portion is filled with writing relating to Sir John Franklin and party. The document was evidently cast into the water in latitude 69.30.42, and longitude 98.45. It gives an account of the desertion of the ship Erebus and Terror. The party numbered 105 at the time of the desertion, and was under the command of F. R. N. Crozier. This party succeeded in reaching the above latitude and longitude, where they found relics of the late Sir John Ross. The document states that the party wintered on a low island in 1847, and Sir John Franklin died 11th June, 1847. It contains many interesting incidents connected with the expedition.—Col.

"WHERE THERE IS LIFE THERE IS HOPE."—A couple named Doney, who were some days since married in England, and whose united ages amount to 150 years, arrived by the Prussian a few days since, and have left for Onario, where the husband owns some property. Doney is aged 77, and his bride 82, being a widow for some five or six months, but who had not forgotten her old sweetheart of 60 years ago.

Henry Bartlett ran away from Portsmouth, N. H., six years ago, went to sea as a cabin boy, tried waiting in a New Orleans saloon, then in Kansas City, and now turns up as the heir to \$75,000.

SOUTHERN PROGRESS.—The Charleston News says that, in 1860, the twelve cotton States "will show more true prosperity than any other section of the world." It estimates that the present crop of cotton will come up to three millions of bales, and that the average value of all the crop will amount to \$64 for every man, woman, and child of the population. As far as South Carolina is concerned, a still more favorable result, it is said, can be predicted. The products of that State this year, the News calculates, will foot up to \$50,000,000, or an average of \$7462 per head of a population of 670,000. There is another very interesting fact mentioned by the News, and that is, that in South Carolina there are now "not fewer than 200,000 whites cultivating cotton with their own hands."

Minnesota has completed its wheat harvest, and estimates the quantity at twenty-two million bushels, of which only six million bushels will be retained in the State.

No less than eight editors in Iowa have been already nominated for the State legislature,—four in each branch, and several others of the fraternity are spoken of for similar positions.

The editor of the Prairie Herald, published near the Rocky Mountains, says he can look out from his office and see antelopes, wolves, and foxes, disputing themselves. Two bears were among his recent visitors, but in consequence of the noise of the cars he is no longer troubled with buffaloes.

Providence, Rhode Island, claims to have two old ladies living in the same house in that city, sisters, each over one hundred and ten years. They were both born in Ireland.

Very serious rumors are afloat as to the condition of the Emperor of Russia. Mental alienation, melancholy madness, is attributed to him. His Majesty is said to seclude himself for days together, refusing to see any one whatever.

An English firm is manufacturing for the Russian Government a huge steam hammer which will weigh in all about one thousand tons. The hammer head alone weighs about forty-two tons, and the anvil block five hundred tons. The hammer, which is believed to be the heaviest in the world, is to be used in forging steel guns.

A photographer attached to the War Office in England has succeeded in measuring distances and heights by means of the camera, thereby making it a formidable agent in military operations.
