LATEST FROM EUROPE.

ENGLAND.—London, Aug. 16.—A riot took place yesterday in Sheffield, occasioned by the mine strike.

Aug. 20.—Queen Victoria has gone to Balmoral.

The British frigate "Galaten," commanded by Prince Alfred, arrived at Honolulu on the 21st ult., and sailed Aug. 24 for Yokohama, Japan.

FRANCE.—Aug. 20.—The London "Times," in an article on French legislative reform, urges that, after ruling the destinies of France for seventeen years, the Emperor Napoleon is making amends for that country's loss of liberty, and paving the way to his son's peaceful accession to the throne.

Aug. 21.—The Prince Imperial and mother the Empress were to depart on Monday for the East.

The French authorities arrested twelve Carlist leaders who attempted to cross the frontier into Spain.

The health of the Emperor Napoleon is improving. Prince Napoleon is to attend the inauguration of the Suez Canal.

ITALY.—London, Aug. 17.—The Pope has decided to hold a universal exhibition of paintings next year.

SPAIN.—Aug. 18.—The "Times," on the Spanish situation, expresses no surprise at the late executions, and says that blood will be as wantonly shed to put down Carlism as was contributed to build it up.

The order lately promulgated by the Regent of Spain obliging the Bishops to warn the Clergy against the Carlism, has been referred to the Papal See by a Bishop denying the jurisdiction of the Government. A meeting of the Cortes has been summoned for the 15th of next month.

The Spanish Government is taking strong measures against Carlist insurgents. Nine Carlist prisoners were recently shot.

Aug. 22.—Madrid advices assert that the preliminaries of a treaty for ceding Cuba to the United States have been signed.

The Spanish Regent, Serrano, positively denies that he sustains the pretensions of the Duke of Montpensier to the Throne of Spain, and declares that he is entirely neutral on the question of the disposal of the Crown.

IRELAND.—London, August 16, (evening).—There was a great Orange demonstration in Clones, Ireland, yesterday; 30,000 people took part in the procession.

At a meeting in Thurlow and Waterford, resolutions have been adopted asking a general amnesty for the Fenians.

Aug. 17.—The Dublin Municipal Council have adopted an address to Earl Spencer, Mr. Gladstone, and Earl Gray, congratulating them and the country on the passage of the Irish Church Bill. The Conservative members of the Council absented themselves when the vote on the address was taken.

Archbishop Cullen has summoned the Roman Catholic Bishops to meet in Council for the discussion of public questions.

Aug. 20.—The Archbishops of Armagh and Dublin have issued calls for the assembling of Provincial Synods. The Dublin Synod is to meet at St. Patrick's Cathedral on the 15th proximo.

AUSTRIA.—London, Aug. 16.—Austria is not to reduce her army, owing to the aspect of European affairs.

London, Aug. 19.—Austria will abandon the military occupation of the frontier, and some important towns are to be put under Civil Government.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS PRINCE ARTHUR arrived at nine o'clock on Sunday last in the R. M. City of Paris, six days and seventeen hours from Queenstown—one of the quickest trips on record. His Royal Highness, attended by his Governor, Col. Elphinstone landed about ten o'clock and was received by His Excellency the Governor-General and by his Honor the Lt. Governor of Nova Scotia. A guard of honor from the 78th Highlanders attended, and a large concourse of people was present. As Prince Arthur landed, three hearty cheers were given him and as he left the wharf. The ships in port were gaily dressed with flags. The Citadel and many private citizens ran up their flags. The day was a magnificent one, and the spectacle was splendid. Shortly after the landing of the Prince the flags of Royal navy were hauled down and the usual quiet of our Sunday resumed.

His Royal Highness attended a special service at Garrison Chapel, at 5 o'clock in the afternoon, a large number of persons, were attracted to the streets near Government House and the above place of worship.

In anticipation of His Royal Highness arrival a programme had been partially prepared on Saturday for his reception. Early on Monday morning the streets and houses in every direction were gaily decorated with flags almost without number, and the city appeared all alive with the various bodies of militia, Volunteers and societies preparing to do their part in showing their joy in receiving the son of Our beloved Queen.

The excitement reached to the Baptist Convention then assembling. As notice had been given that the public landing would be at 12 o'clock it was deemed unwise to proceed in the usual order with the Convention Sermon. It was therefore determined to defer the Sermon till Tuesday morning, and proceed with the business for a short time and then adjourn and proceed in a body to the place of landing of Prince Arthur. Brethren Miles and Ackhurst were appointed Marshalls and the members of the Convention went together in procession to H. M. Dockyard where the heads of the departments, members of the Provincial and City Governments, the Judges, and the Magistracy of the county were assembled.

H. M. S. Royal Alfred was alongside the wharf gaily dressed in bunting, the royal standard was raised on the Dockyard pole. Prince Arthur shortly made his appearance on the platform, which was filled with gentlemen. Cheers arose all around from the crowds assembled.

His Worship the Mayor welcomed the Recorder to read the Address of Welcome expressive of the loyal feelings cherished by the citizens of this country and city, and the warm interest they felt in the grandson of a former Governor of Nova Scotia.

The following is the reply of Prince Arthur: To the Mayor and Corporation of the City of Halifax:

GENTLEMEN.—Most sincerely do I thank you for the loyal address which you have just presented to me, and I avail myself of this opportunity to request you to convey to the Citizens of Halifax, of whom you are the representatives, my grateful thanks for the kind, the hearty welcome which has this day been accorded to me.

I can assure you that I have looked forward with anticipations of great pleasure to my visit to the British Dominions on this side of the Atlantic, and it is to me a source of great satisfaction to hear, on my first landing here, how highly cherished is still the memory of my illustrious Grandfather, who governed this Province so long.

Your touching allusion to the Queen, and your kind wishes for my welfare will be most gratifying to Her Majesty, and I feel sure that she

will hear with pleasure how cordial and hearty has been her son's reception amongst you.

ARTHUR.

After a number of introductions. The procession formed and marched in company with the royal cortege to Government House.

A large number of the Benevolent Societies and domestic soldiery joined in the procession. The children of the Public Schools were assembled in the street, south of the Parade, and sang the National Anthem as the procession passed along. In the evening a Grand Illumination of the city took place. The decorations of several of the houses and stores were very beautiful and the streets were filled with people.

Prince Arthur has very much the appearance the Prince of Wales had when he visited this city, perhaps slightly stouter and of lighter complexion. His countenance is a most pleasing one and calculated to make a good impression wherever he appears in his visit to this continent.

GENERAL DOYLE ON DISLOYALTY.—The Windsor and Annapolis Railway was opened by the Governor General Sir John Young, on Wednesday last. At the dinner at Kentville, General Doyle made some reference to his late Digby speech which has been subjected to severe criticism and misconstruction. The following is his explanation:

When I was recently at Digby I received a loyal address, to which I responded as I best could. In answer to that address I made use of certain expressions to the effect that I was particularly anxious to get rid of disloyal and discontented people. Some persons have thought I was anxious to get rid of those who differ from me in politics. God forbid! (Cheers.)

A fair opposition is always essential to good government. I do not intend any disrespect to the United States. I have been all over that country. I admire their men, and especially the General who is now their President, and I trust in God that we may forever be at peace with that country. Do not let it be supposed that in the remarks I made, I intended any disrespect to the United States. I repeat now what I said at Digby, that I do wish that everybody who does not desire to live under the British flag should move out of this Province. [Loud and repeated cheers.] I thank you gentlemen, for those cheers. I knew that I was in the midst of loyal spirits. I have been told that I am too loyal. Well gentlemen, I imbibe loyalty with my mother's milk—it is in my bones and marrow, and any one who desires to cure me of that complaint will have to proceed to extremities. A good deal of blood letting will have to be done, and I will only be cured of my loyalty when I part with the last drop of blood. I do not wish to see them who differ from me in politics leave the Province, but I do wish to see every disloyal man out of it. (Cheers.)
