INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY,

The Commissioners appointed to construct the Intercolonial Railway give PUBLIC NOTICE that they are now prepared to receive Tenders for five further Sections of the line.

CONTRACT No. 8 will be the Province of Quebec and extend from the Easterly end of Contract No. 5, at Rimouski to a point near the Metis River, about 20 1/2 miles in length.

CONTRACT No. 9 will be in the Province of New Brunswick, and extend from the Easterly end of Contract No. 6, towards the Town of Bathurst, about 20 1/2 miles in length.
