WHERE BEES GATHER HONEY.

" Bees gather no honey from flowers except the latter are in a damp state " Hence, he concludes that there is no such thing as white clover honey, breause bees never work on this plant except when it is dry, and then but little in proportion to the work they do on other plants. He says, "White clover contains no sweet. Bees collect from it brown bread. They collect bread from all flowers in a dry state. My bees gathered very little last season, but it was not because there was not an abundance of white clover, for I never saw it more plenty." He asks, "How does the bee separate the water from honey? He takes honey and water together into his body and throws off the water as he is flying. In the morning, look over the buck-wheat towards the sun, and you will often see him fly up and throw the water. He collects the water and the honey at the same time, but he carries nothing into his hive but what is fit for storage."

A correspondent of the Bee Journal plants catnip along the fences, and out-ofthe-way places, where weeds usually grow, for forage for bees. He says bees work on it in all kinds of weather. A slight frost does not kill it as it does other flowering plants, and it is in bloom from the time it first makes its appearance, until killed by the frost in the fall.

SAVING THE PIECES.

Any farmer who does not practice saving pieces would be surprised at the real profit derived by laying up the odds and ends about his premises. Every day, almost, there are bits thrown away, at the time considered of no value, which, perhaps, not many days subsequent, would save both time and money. How many times a year does a farmer want a strip of board, a piece of wedge or pine timber, something for a hammer-handle, or rake-tooth, which cannot be obtained without spoiling valuable material, or going to some carpenters shop; and, perhaps, while this delay is made, a team and hired man are standing still waiting for a broken tool to be put in order .- Ohio Farmer.

PROPAGATING CURRANTS.

This is usual in the spring; but those who have tried propagating from cuttings at other seasons of the year have met with good success, and commend fall instead of spring for doing it. The reason given is that current-wood can be turned into plant the year it is grown by setting any time from August to November. The best way is to make a square, clean cut; make the ground mellow, that the rootlets may meet with no obstructions, and then brush the dirt closely around the bottom of the cutting. The fall is decidedly the best time to commence operations; because, in so doing, one gets a two-years' growth in one. If it is very dry, some mulching will be required; but generally, at this season, the ground is warmer than the atmosphere.

TURNIP FLY.

Sowing ashes and scot, or ashes alone, on the young plants during the time the dew is on them; this is one of the most efficacious plans which has been tried. Strange as it may appear, the dust of dry earth or sand answers nearly if not quite as well.
