A PUBLIC BATHING-HOUSE is said to have been finished, and towed to its place last week. All in good time for the warm weather next summer.

THE WIDOW'S SON LODGE OF THE INDEPENDENT ORDER OF GOOD TEMPLARS, was formed in the basement of Salem chapel a few days since. Every such additional agency must increase the Temperance sentiment in the community.

CHURCH EDIFICES, are being greatly improved in Halifax. The St. Andrew's congregation met on Wednesday evening last, and resolved to erect a new building in Tobin Street. A Subscription list was opened by one person putting down \$3,000, another \$2,000, another \$12,00, &c. &c. The old building would find a purchaser at not less than \$12,000, so that a fair start has been made. With the wealth of the Church of Scotland, they will doubtless erect a handsome structure.

At a recent meeting in the Grafton Street Wesleyan church, \$7,500 was subscribed towards removing the debt of \$10,700. The building cost \$36,000.

THE NEW POOR'S ASYLUM, is finished, and being partially occupied. It is a magnificent building having about a million and a half of brick used in its construction, at a cost of about \$81,000. The centre building is seven stories high, and the wings five stories.

It appears that the builder Mr. Peters, will be a heavy loser by his job. The great kitchen is 71 feet by 36. All the arrangements are most complete and of the most approved description.

His Excellency General Sir H. Doyle, has been visiting the Public Schools of the city during the past week. They are pronounced in an efficient state.

ACCIDENT.—A young man named William Fowler, had his hand severely mangled on Friday last, by some machinery at the Truro Boot and Shoe Manufactory.

MR. F. W. GEORGE, has commenced proceedings in the Supreme Court, for the purpose of ascertaining if the Rev. Mr. Darragh has a right to exercise the office of Inspector of Schools in Cumberland County, seeing that his appointment is not in accordance with the requirements of the law.

A DEAD WHALE was washed ashore at Economy a few days since. Its length was 75 feet; across the tail 17 feet; the upper jaw measured 15 feet in length, and the lower jaw 18 feet, the fins were 9 feet in length. The fortunate finder will make a little harvest from the oil, it is said about \$600. The skeleton should be preserved whole if possible.

The "Chronicle" says that the name of the firm of defaulters at Canning, recently referred to is George E. Eaton & Co. Their Halifax creditors are "in" amounts from \$6,000 downwards.

RAILWAY MATTERS.—The N. B. Eastern Extension was opened to Sackville on Wednesday last.

The W. & Annapolis, is already for opening, but the cars being wider than the N. S. railcars, it has been found necessary to make some alteration at the stations. At the trial of the bridge it was found that the deflection was only half-an-inch, which sprung back on removing the weight from the bridge.
