

in Rome, and the members of the Corps Diplomatique, and other notables. The ceremonies exceeded any that have taken place in Rome within the present century.

Letters from Rome assert that the majority of the Archbishops, and many others of the German Bishops, will oppose the declaration of the Dogma of the Papal infallibility.

The Pope delivered an allocution before the Ecumenical Council on Friday, in which he condemned the false human science and impiety which hide themselves behind the present aspirations for liberty.

Dec. 13.—The sessions of the Council at Rome have been adjourned until after Epiphany January 6th.

PRUSSIA.—Dec. 9.—The Prince of Montenegro has protested against the intention of Austria to occupy his territory with troops, and the Prussian Government sustains Montenegro.

SPAIN.—London, Dec. 5.—Rumors of Carlist insurrections in Spain continue to circulate. The Carlist Chief, Pulo, has been convicted of treason and sentenced to death.

THE SUZ CANAL.—Dec. 6.—The barque "Noel," bound to Bombay, which was the first mercantile vessel to pass through the Suez Canal with a cargo, has been wrecked in the Red Sea, 88 miles from Suez.

Dec. 10.—The Viceroy of Egypt has yielded to the ultimatum of the Sultan, and accepted all the conditions it imposes.

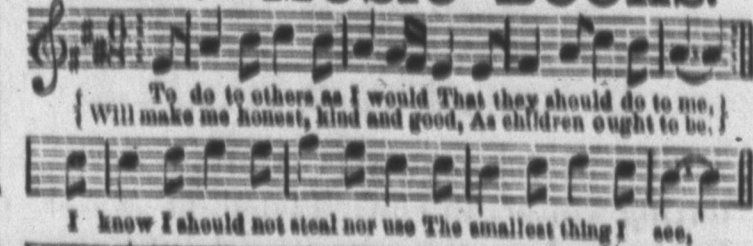
