

in the higher branches. The metropolitan county is entitled to this, surely, no less than the other counties, and we trust that the Commissioners will allow as little time as possible to pass before endeavouring to meet this crying desideratum.

The following curious case is from a late issue of the *London Independent*. The Rev. Mr. Goucher, spoken of, is a native of Nova Scotia and well known to many of our readers:

"The Rev. J. W. Goucher, once a student in a Baptist college and then a minister of a Congregational church, has, it appears, built a church at Kilburn, which he is now anxious to make over to the Church of England; but, strange to say, the Bishop of London will not have him and his church as a gift. We learn this fact from a correspondence which has just appeared in the *Kilburn Times*. A memorial from 530 persons was presented to the Bishop, praying him to license the building, describing themselves as persons 'interested in establishing and increasing the number of churches for the purpose of worship on true Protestant principles;' but the Bishop would have nothing to do with them, and all the explanation they could get from his Lordship was that he has 'strong reasons' for declining. Mr. Goucher, however, takes pains to explain that the movement on his part arose from 'an earnest desire that the Church of England, attacked on all hands, should receive the full benefit of the movement I have initiated at Cambridge-road, I cheerfully waived all personal and proprietary rights in the Church of St. James', placing, not only a comfortable edifice, but a respectable congregation at the unreserved disposal of his lordship. My own reordination as a minister of the Church of England I made quite a subordinate consideration, and what was asked for was simply that the church should be placed under Episcopal licence, with a clergyman of the Bishop's own nomination. This very reasonable offer (as it seems to me) has been rejected. For my part I can only regret the result. My duty, however, seems clear. I, as minister of St. James's Church, intend going on in the future as I have gone on in the past, preaching the Gospel of salvation, in harmony with the creed and liturgy of the National Church." "Simon Straightforward" in a clever letter sets the transaction in its true light. Mr. Goucher's offer to place "a respectable congregation" at the Bishop's service, his readiness to be reordained, and his kind desire to shield the Church of England, now "attacked on all sides," are trenchantly dealt with. He writes:—"A respectable congregation" would be placed 'at the unreserved disposal of his lordship!' This is rich. The Bishop, if he saw it, must have put on two pair of spectacles, to be certain there was no mistake. It smacks of the middle-ages. In this nineteenth century we here read of a community allowing a gentleman to say that 'He would place them at the unreserved disposal of his lordship,' for his kicks or his kisses—laughter or pity—blessing or cursing, or even to be made a pavement on the high road to Rome. Surely these good people have forgotten that a congregation does not exist for the benefit of the clergy, but the clergy are the servants of the congregation. Mr. Goucher would also place himself at the 'unreserved disposal of his lordship;' for he says he made his 'reordination' quite a subordinate consideration. This seems to me a great act of self denial on his part which calls for our admiration. If Mr. Goucher felt that hitherto he had not received power to preach, but had been only playing at it for practice, he was quite right in seeking this ordination—if indeed it will give him the power. But his words imply that he thinks he has power, and therefore I say it must be an act of self-denial on his part that he should be willing to go through the humiliating process of kneeling before the Bishop to hear these words addressed to him:—

"Receive the Holy Ghost for the office and work of a priest in the Church of God, now committed unto thee by the imposition of our hands. Whose sins thou dost forgive, they are forgiven; and whose sins thou dost retain, they are retained."

When Richard Baxter was asked to submit to this, he said:—

"At best to be reordained seemeth but a taking of God's name in vain, and a solemn praying to God for that which we have already; and a pretending de novo to receive that authority which we had before. . . . and a ludicrously playing with holy things."

John Howe said, 'It hurts my understanding; it is an absurdity!' Yet Mr. Goucher would make it 'quite a subordinate consideration!' Wonderful, this abnegation of self!"

General Intelligence.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—We regret to learn of a serious accident to Mr. John Bars, eldest son of Simon F. Bars, Esq. Mr. B. was riding a Velocipede in the Spring Garden Rink, had made the round of the building twice, and was going round the third time at an increased rate of speed, when the floor being slippery, the machine careened over, the wheel striking the rider on the right leg, and breaking it between the knee and thigh.

SUPREME COURT.—The case of the *Brothers Conlon* against the *Halifax City Railroad Company*, terminated late on Friday, having occupied the attention of the Court since Tuesday morning. As the trial progressed it created a good deal of interest—particularly amongst the cabmen and truckmen.

The Plaintiffs claimed the sum of *Two thousand dollars* damages for breakages to their omnibuses, cabs and carriages from June 1866 when the road was opened for traffic, until April 1868—the date of the commencement of the action. They presented a long catalogue of accidents. The jury were out four hours and returned with a verdict for the defendant.

JUMPED OVERBOARD.—A sailor, named John Davis, who has been confined in Rockhead Prison for some weeks back for stealing and destroying some property of the Captain of the *Video*, (and whose fine the Captain paid yesterday, intending to take him away with him on the sailing of the vessel), was conveyed to the ship in the charge of two policemen in a boat yesterday afternoon. On reaching the ship the mate called out to iron him. He at once declared that he would never do that, and jumped into the sea. The boat went after him, picked him up and took him back to the ship.—Recorder.

The Depot of the 30th Foot will move from Chatham to Waterford, to join the service companies of the Regiment on their arrival from Nova Scotia.

MAILS TO NOVA SCOTIA AND THE LOWER PROVINCES.—The *City of Boston*, which is one of Mr. Inman's favorite boats, having been entirely refitted, left on April 21 with the letter bags for the colonies above named, and it may be now the proper time to congratulate our friends in Nova Scotia, Cape Breton, Newfoundland, Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, upon that gentleman's determination to have the mails despatched by vessels which will not only carry them punctually and quickly, but will also afford the best accommodation for passengers in saloon and steerage. We understand that the *City of Washington*, which is now being lengthened by forty feet, the *City of New York*, and the *Etna*, are the boats in future destined to carry the pendant of the Inman Royal Mail Company to Halifax, and this is a circumstance which will enable the people of the Lower Provinces to calculate to a day when they may expect their packets from the "old country," winter and summer alike.—*European Mail*.

MUTINY AT SEA.—The barque *Alice Roy*, Capt. Douglas, bound to Montevideo, was the scene of a mutiny, which was only quelled by the shooting of one of the rioters. They were no sooner on board than they wanted to go on shore again to get some articles for the voyage as they stated. The captain would allow but one of them to go, as he said one could do the business for all of them. This seems to have put them in the "sulks," and shortly after the vessel sailed they became very mutinous. On Friday last matters had proceeded to such a point, that the captain determined to put the men in irons.—When they were told to come aft, they laughed at the captain, and dared him to do anything. The second mate then took hold of one of them, a very powerful man, but was met with a blow which nearly knocked him overboard, and the mate who also interfered, received a severe cut with a club in the face. Finally one of the mutineers made at the captain with an axe, and chased him two or three times round the deck. The captain had a pistol in his hand, but did not use it. The Steward, seeing this, and thinking that if the fellow caught the captain, he would probably kill him, ran across the deck, seized the pistol from the captain's hand, and shot the fellow. This put a stop to the mutiny, and the Captain bore up for this port. The man is wounded in the side, below the lung, and it is feared that the wound will prove fatal. An enquiry is now going on before Stipendiary Magistrate Shiels. The *Alice Roy* belongs to Maitland, N. S.
