

Mr. Disraeli admitted his intention to aim a mortal blow at the bill, but if the motion were accepted the Government would still continue the disestablishment policy.

The House decided on Mr. Disraeli's motion as follows—for, 221; against, 344; Government majority, 123. The result was received with tremendous cheers by the Liberals.

FRANCE.—London, April 15.—The Paris "Presse" newspaper says that the rejection of the Alabama claims' treaty, by the United States Senate, will be the cause of great prejudice to the United States in Europe.

Next August the entire imperial family of France will celebrate the one hundredth anniversary of the birth of the great Napoleon in Corsica.

18th.—Paris advices report that the Corps Legislatif was yesterday the scene of wild excitement. Thiers in his speech denounced what is called "The Commercial liberties of France, as like the political liberties of the people, a farce."

M. Quetier in, some remarks, demanded that the legislation of commercial treaties be vested in the Corps Legislatif instead of the Crown.

Rome, April 12. The Pope's jubilee was celebrated at Rome with great splendor. The Pope said Mass at St. Peter's, and a Te Deum was sung in the presence of Cardinals, foreign ambassadors, notabilities from all parts of Europe, and an immense congregation in the evening.

The Pope on the occasion of the jubilee in celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of his accession to the priesthood, granted pardons to large numbers of persons, including many political offenders.

AUSTRIA.—Vienna, April 13.—The elections in Hungary and Cervetia have resulted largely in favor of the Deak Liberal party, which will have a majority of 100 members in the new Diet.

JAPAN.—London, April 14.—Later advices have been received from Yokohama and Hong Kong. Civil war was raging again with increased violence in the Japanese empire.

An earthquake had been felt in Japanese Islands, but at last dates no loss of life or property is reported, and the shocks were slight.

SPAIN.—London, April 18th.—It is reported that Prince Frederick Charles of Prussia, and the Duke of Luxembourg, will be put forward as candidates for the Throne of Spain.

CHINA.—London, April 14.—The news from China is meagre. At Foochow the persecution of the native Christians continued.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE, OTTAWA, Thursday, 25th day of March, 1869. PRESENT: His Excellency the Governor General in Council. WHEREAS, by the 27th section of the Act 31st Vic. Cap. 6, intituled: "An Act respecting the Customs," it is provided that "in all cases where duties are charged according to the weight, tare, gauge or measure, such allowances shall be made for tare and draft upon the packages, as may be appointed by regulation made by the Governor in Council." And whereas it is desirable to establish a uniform practice at all the Ports of Entry in the Dominion, in reference to the allowance for tare on sugar— On the recommendation of the Honourable the Minister of Customs, His Excellency has been pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following regulations be, and the same are hereby adopted: From and after this date there shall be allowed for tare on sugar imported in hogsheads, twelve per centum, and in tierces fourteen per centum of the gross weight of each, and on barrels, an allowance of twenty six pounds each. On bags in which sugar is imported, an average tare shall be allowed, to be ascertained by weighing one bag out of every ten. If in any case, objection is taken to the above scale of allowances for tare, then the actual tare according to the original invoices may be allowed, subject, however, to such examination, either by actual weighing or appraisement, as may be thought necessary by the Collector of the Port, to prove that the actual weight of the packages is not less than that stated in such invoices.
