His Honor the Lieutenant Governor by the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to appoint W. A. D. Morse, to be Judge of Probate for the County of Cumberland, in the place of Clifford K. Morse, deceased.

A NEW LINE OF STEAMBOATS.—It is said that on the completion of the Annapolis and Windsor railway, a line of Clyde built steamers, capable of steaming 11 knots an hour, will be started between Portland and Annapolis. It is calculated that the trip from Annapolis to Portland, or vice versa, can be made in twelve hours, giving about thirty hours from Halifax to New York, or thirty-six from this city to Montreal.—*Citizen.*

RESIGNATION OF JUDGE BLISS.—We understand that Hon. William Blowers Bliss, one of the Puisne Judges of the Supreme Court of this Province, has tendered his resignation.

The Acadia Fire Insurance Company has declared a dividend of 12½ per cent.

During the year 1868 the number of actual fires in Halifax was 26; in Dartmouth 3. The number of false alarms in Halifax was 21; in Dartmouth 1.

More School accommodation is required at the North-end of Halifax. We are informed that the Commissioners propose erecting another school-house there.

STREET EXTENSION.—It appears probable that Barrington Street will be extended northward to meet Lockman Street.

KING'S COUNTY.—There are doubtless vast resources in this county yet developed. Its agriculture has hitherto placed it in the front, its soil being of unsurpassed excellence, and its climate so well adapted for the maturing of fine fruit. There being so much value to be obtained from the surface, but little attention has been paid to what lies underneath. Recently Gold has been found in the Gasperagax mountain, this will probably soon supply profitable employment for a large number of persons. Coal is believed to exist a only a short distance beyond Windsor, and probably at other places in the county. The opening of the Railway will add a new stimulus to the search for this essential article of home use and commerce. With the facilities for supplying all parts of the province and for shipping, there is no doubt, but that labor and money expended in this direction would soon prove abundantly remunerative, and yield a profitable return to capitalists for their investments.

COLONIAL ACTS OF PARLIAMENT.—A case is pending in the Court of Queen's Bench in England which raises the question of the validity of Acts of Colonial Parliaments in certain cases. Mr. Phillips sues Mr. Eyre for damages sustained by him through the acts of the latter in Jamaica. The ex-Governor pleads that the Parliament of Jamaica passed an act of Indemnity in regard to such acts. The plaintiff's counsel argued that the act could not interfere with the vested rights of the plaintiff under the laws of England. The Court reserved its decision.—*St. John Journal.*

Important On Dits.—That Hon Mr. Howe and A. W. McLellan, Esq., M. P. for Colchester shortly leave Halifax to meet Hon. Mr. Rose at Portland, on his way to London.

It is further asserted that, if matters can be satisfactorily arranged by Mr. Rose with the British and the Dominion House of Commons, Mr. Howe will take the appointment of President of the Privy Council, vice Blair, deceased, and run his election for Hants. Election to come off before House meets. Mr. McLellan, it is said takes a seat at the Railway Board.—*Reporter.*

The St. John Telegraph states that Hon. Joseph Howe will soon be made Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, a position which he will probably hold for the remainder of his life.

SYDNEY HARBOR was unobstructed by ice on the 2nd Inst. An unusual circumstance.

The Ladies of the Presbyterian Church, River John, County of Pictou, held a Tea Meeting on Christmas Eve, at which they realized \$227.63.

Large quantities of herring and codfish are being taken by the fishermen in the harbors westward of Halifax. There has been great need of this all along the coast.

THE EEL TRADE.—Upwards of two tons of frozen eels arrived here the other day, by rail, from Pictou, for shipment to the United States. The lot was taken in Antigonishe harbor in a few few days. This trade may supply a profitable source of employment to many of our fishermen on the harbors along the coast.

YARMOUTH, Jan. 11th.—A meeting was held in Yarmouth to consider the question of the Railway extension to that town.

An unanimous vote was given to Clements for his efforts in connection with Railway Extension.

A very large majority voted in favour of an application to the Dominion Parliament in aid thereof.

The Anti opposition to the last vote was very great. But the vote was carried.—*Reporter.*

PETROLEUM is reported to have been discovered at Salmon River in Guysboro County. A gentleman from Canada, Mr. Carter has been concerned in the Petroleum business at Brookville and Entiskenen in Ontario, and has much experience in boring and discovering deposits of crude Petroleum, he is sanguine that the article will be found in paying quantities at Salmon River.

MELANCHOLY CATASTROPHE.—On Wednesday last there were indications of a vessel having been lost off Prospect, at the entrance of Halifax Harbor. It was subsequently supposed that it was the A. R. Dunlap, which has been running as a packet between Halifax and Boston for Messrs. Lawson, Harrington & Co. The wheel cover having the name of that vessel was picked up on the shore rendered it pretty certain that this was the vessel lost. Each day since articles have been found proving the correctness of this conclusion.

A telegram received on Friday by the agents, Messrs. Lawson, Harrington & Co., gives the following list of passengers by the brigantine "A. R. Dunlap," from Boston for this port: Angus McDonald, B. F. McKay, Julia Talbot, J. Keefer, David Wait. The names of the crew are as follows: A. R. Dunlap, Captain; Andrew McPherson, mate; William Calkin, John Williams, (colored boy), Joseph Percy, and Edward Harnish, seamen. Most of the crew belonged to Queen's County. The whole thirteen it appears have met a watery grave. One body, that of Miss Talbot, came ashore at first, and, singularly enough, her relatives resided in the immediate locality of the wreck.

It is supposed that the vessel struck on Meagher's rock, a dangerous point off Prospect, and that she immediately sank. The body of a dog belonging to the vessel was also washed ashore.

The "A. R. Dunlap," was a new vessel, owned by Clark & Woodward, of Boston, Lawson, Harrington & Co., of Halifax, and Captain Dunlap. She is insured in the Cobequid Office, Truro, for \$2,000.

The following are given as the principal parts of her cargo, owned by various parties in this city: flour, 200 bbls; glassware, 25 packages; petroleum oil, 6 bbls; mill picks, 1 bundle; brooms, 30 dozen; books, 1 bundle; 1 steam pump; sugar, 50 bbls; bread, 20 bbls and boxes; hardware, 15 cases; cotton, 1 case; coffee, 25 boxes; salt, 47 cases; 1 leather splitter.

Operations are being vigorously prosecuted at the Antigonishe Salt Works. Considerable new machinery has been put up at the works within the past few weeks.

RAILWAY TO YARMOUTH.—The survey of the proposed Railway between Yarmouth and Annapolis was to be commenced on Thursday, the 7th inst., under the superintendence of Collingwood Schrieber, C. E.

It is proposed to have some floating Bathing Houses for Halifax. A gentleman has submitted plans to the Mayor and Alderman.

SPECIE.—The steamer City of Manchester brought from Liverpool \$250,000 in gold, for the Commissary Department.

AMHERST.—The Rev. G. Townshend delivered an excellent address on Tuesday last at the opening of the Academy. Rev. Dr. Clarke, Senator Dickey and several other gentlemen also spoke on the occasion. The principal, Mr. Mellish pointed out some particulars which he regarded as essential in carrying out the educational work of the Academy.

The students of Dalhousie College, are proposing to commence the publication of a Semi-Monthly Gazette.

The absence of snow birds this season is matter for remark in many places.

TITLES.—We learn from the Ottawa Times that "Her Majesty the Queen has been pleased to confer upon Major-General Doyle, Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, the title of Knight Commander of the Order of St Michael and St. George."

This we learn is in recognition of valuable services performed during the Trent difficulty.

It is also reported that a Despatch was received on Tuesday, stating that Her Majesty has been pleased to confer the honor of Knighthood on Chief Justice William Young.

THE PHILHARMONIC SOCIETY recently formed in this city is in very successful operation, under the able direction of Mr. Doane. We understand that it is the intention of the Society, at an early day, to bring out some of the classical Sacred music—vocal and instrumental—they have been practising.

THE TROOPS made a splendid display on Friday last headed by His Honor Major General Doyle. They marched up the road in full equipments. The streets were of course crowded with people who were evidently pleased to witness the fine military spectacle, and to recognize the Lieutenant Governor who had just received his new honors from Her Majesty.

ATTEMPT AT FORGERY.—A young man named A. W. St. Jean, employed by Messrs. Shannon & Morse, was arrested on Tuesday, charged with forging the signature of his employers on the Bank of British North America, for \$22. When arrested he had on his person an order for \$30 on Mr. Sanford Fleming, bearing the signature of Capt. Telfer, of the steamer "Flamborough," which was found to be a forgery.

St. Jean is a French Canadian, apparently between twenty-five and thirty years of age. He is a native of Quebec, the son of respectable parents, and it is said a nephew of Sir N. F. Belleau, Lieut. Governor of Quebec. He is not a new hand at the forgery business, having been convicted of the crime in Canada, sentenced to twenty years' imprisonment, and released through the influence of his friends on the occasion of the visit of the Prince of Wales.

On examination it was found that there was insufficient evidence remaining to convict him of the crime of forgery, but St. Jean was charged with obtaining goods under false pretenses.

THE INLAND FISHERY LAW.—A man named Meagher, belonging to Margaret's Bay, was fined \$40 and costs last week, for unlawfully setting nets in Hosiery River.



INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY.

The Commissioners appointed to construct the Intercolonial Railway give Public Notice that they intend to let 4 sections of the line at once.

Section Nos 1 and 2 embrace about 40 miles from a junction with the Grand Trunk Railway, near Riviere du Loup, and each section will be about 20 miles in length.

Section No. 3 will be about 26 miles in length and lies between the East side of Restigouche River to near Dalhousie in New Brunswick.

Section No. 4 will be about 24 miles in length and lies between Amherst and River Philip in Nova Scotia.

Plans and profiles with specifications and terms of contract will be exhibited at the offices of the Commissioners in Ottawa, Riviere du Loup, Dalhousie, St. John and Halifax, on and after the 11th January, 1869, and sealed Tenders addressed "To the Commissioners of the Intercolonial Railway," will be received at their office in Ottawa up to 4 o'clock on the 8th February, 1869.
