

quiet with the view to prevent the expulsion of the Greeks from the Ottoman territory. It is intimated that the representative of the Porte will leave the Conference if this point is introduced for discussion, and warns Russia of another Crimean war. It is said that Greece will introduce the claims of the Cretans into the conference about to meet in Paris, and demand that they shall be allowed to declare by plebiscetum who shall be their rulers.

On the 7th the Sublime Porte sent a communication to Paris asking for a postponement of the Conference on the Eastern question for eight days, in order that instructions may be prepared for the representatives of the Turkish Government.

The telegram from London on the 8th states that the request of the Sublime Porte for a postponement of the Conference on the Eastern question for a few days in order that time might be gained for instructing the Turkish representative, has not been acceded to. The session of the Conference will certainly meet to-morrow; the Sultan consequently has been compelled to telegraph at length from Constantinople his instructions to Diamel Mehemet Pasha, the Turkish Ambassador at Paris. There is no question but a part of these instructions are that if the discussion in the Conference extend beyond the Sublime Porte's ultimatum to the Grecian Government, the Turkish representative shall immediately withdraw.

The "Tergis," the official newspaper at Constantinople, in its issue of yesterday, said that if the Turkish representative withdraws from the Conference, war with Greece is inevitable.

Jan. 8th.—The firm attitude of Turkey on the Eastern question excites much alarm. A despatch from Vienna asserts that the representatives of the Greek Government at the Paris Conference will not be permitted to offer any proposition, but will attend only for the purpose of giving information in regard to the subjects under discussion. The Conference will frame a project of settlement which it is the intention of Greece to adopt after its acceptance by the Sublime Porte, and the withdrawal of the Turkish ultimatum.

Jan. 9.—Advices from Candia by mail fully confirm the previous report of the submission of the Cretans to Turkish authority.

Jan. 10.—The Conference for a settlement of the dispute between Greece and Turkey; met in Paris yesterday. The Greek and Turkish Representatives manifested a very conciliatory disposition, and a peaceful result is looked forward to with confidence. The next session would take place on Tuesday, the 12th.

FRANCE.—A writer in the London Times of to-day discusses the present situation of France. He says the year ends with the most peace the world ever saw—pronounces M. Rouher a mere Maitre du Palais—notices the growth of Democratic sentiments in France, and declares that the Emperor must either check the press or abandon Personal Government.

Paris, Jan. 7.—The dullness of the Bourse on Tuesday, and the national decline in rentes, were caused by the demands said to have been made by the Russian Emperor on the Sublime Porte. Bullion in Bank of France has decreased during the week 27,500,000 francs.

ITALY.—London, Jan. 7.—The disturbances in Italy caused by the collection of the unpopular taxes, continue. There is also much agitation in Reggio and Bologna. Lieut.-General Cadrona, commandant of the military division of Florence, has been despatched to Parma to restore order in that city.

Jan. 9.—Rumors are current that an insurrection has broken out in Milan.

SPAIN.—Advices from Spain via London, Jan. 6th, report quite formidable republican demonstrations at Seville and Jerez De La Frontera. At the latter place the insurgents made a futile attempt to seize the ammunition from the arsenal. Gen. Roads immediately sent a strong force of soldiers to hold the town and remove the arms to Cadiz for safety.

A proclamation has been issued raising the state of siege at Madrid.

Gen. Prim in an official circular declares that the Provisional Government does not intend to disarm the volunteers.

A Carlist conspiracy has been discovered in Barcelona, with ramifications in Saragossa and other places. Many persons have been arrested, implicated in the conspiracy, among them Costello, a noted Carlist. The peasantry of Andalusia, pressed by poverty, have organized into plundering parties and are pillaging the rich land holders.

A despatch dated London, Jan. 9, says the Spanish Government is about to establish a corps of observation on the Pyrenees.

Despatches from Madrid report that much agitation prevails in all parts of Spain.

Jan. 11.—A Roman despatch of Sunday, says Pius 9th shows great uneasiness concerning the danger to which the Catholic Church is exposed in Spain. He is particularly frightened at the danger threatening the unity of the faith which has ever formed the glory of that Catholic nation.
