MORE GOLD.—Mr. Duncan Campbell, of Truro, has discovered a lead of gold bearing quartz ten feet thick between Salmon River and Beaver Harbor, East Halifax. We have seen some fine specimens taken from the lead. Mr. Campbell has leased the property, and proposes to commence mining operations in the spring.—Chr.

GOLD IN YARMOUTH.—A St. John paper says, we were shown yesterday, by Mr. Daniel Hattie of Sherbrooke, a wedge of Yarmouth Gold, worth about \$70. It was the product of 84 tons of quartz—64 tons of which consisted of loose boulders found on the beach, at Cranberry Head, near Yarmouth.
