**GOVERNMENT HOUSE, OTTAWA,**
Friday, 23d June, 1869.**PRESIDENT:**

His Excellency the Governor-General in Council.

WHEREAS it is enacted by the 3rd subsection of the 33rd Section of the Act 31, Vict. Cap 8, intituled: "An act respecting the inland Revenue," that "any use made of any Utensil, Coach-frame, Mast or Hull for the steeping, germinating or trying of any grain shall be a working of a Malt-house and acting as a Maister," within the meaning of that Act. And whereas it is expedient to the public interest that the stringencies of the above mentioned enactment should be so far relaxed as to permit licensed Brewers to kiln dry damaged grain under certain regulations without payment of duty.—

His Excellency is directed, on the recommendation of the Honourable the Acting Minister of Inland Revenue, and under the authority given in the 49th Section of the Act 31 Vict. Cap 8, has been pleased to order, and it is hereby Ordered that licensed Masters and others engaged in that pursuit shall be allowed to kiln dry damaged grain of all kinds, without payment of the duty of one cent per pound thereon in the following conditions:

1st.—The period for drying damaged grain shall in each case be regulated by the Collector of Inland Revenue;

2d.—The drying shall be done under the personal inspection of the Officer of Excise detailed for that purpose;

3d.—The owner of the grain or trying kiln shall pay to the Collector of Inland Revenue, such sum as shall be sufficient to cover the expense incurred in the survey of drying damaged grain;

4th.—It will be the duty of the Officer to examine closely, and ascertain whether the damaged grain is germinating, and if it be, to report the same to the Collector forthwith.
