THE NEW HYMN BOOK

advertized in another page is now ready. The "Selection of Hymns and Spiritual Songs" contains 179 hymns; 135 of which are the best and most popular ones in the "Psalmist" numbered the same as in that collection. It also contains 34 others—not found there. These, from page 88 to the end, are alphabetically arranged; so that if a person in a social meeting commences to sing one of them, without giving its number, all who have the book may immediately turn to the hymn and join in singing it.

Lively singing by a whole assembly adds vastly to the devotion and profit of public or social worship. Having the words before one is an important point in his being able to join in this delightful exercise. When all have the words a great step is taken towards securing this unanimous expression of God's praise in a congregation.

The object of this "Selection" is to enable every man and woman (and every child who can read) to have a Hymn Book of their own and be able to join in singing the praises of the Most High. The price of the book barely covers the cost. It is made so low that none may find it difficult to procure it. We doubt not that congregations agreeing to adopt the "Selection" will soon find a vast improvement and much additional enjoyment in this part of their social religious services.

We have received a few copies from the binder and shall have the whole shortly. Those who send on their orders first will be first supplied.

We have a number of letters from ministering brethren in various parts of the provinces, who have felt the want of a book of hymns such as we proposed in this "selection" and expressing warm approval of the design. Some have already sent on orders. Those from the Westward, we propose to fill by either taking or forwarding to the Western Association at Hebron. If other orders from that direction are received in time we shall do the same with them.

DISMISSAL OF THE CUMBERLAND SCHOOL INSPECTOR.

The appointment of the Rev. Mr. Darragh, School Inspector for Cumberland County in place of F. W. George, Esq., M. A. has caused considerable excitement in that county and amongst political parties generally. The following is from the Amherst Gazette:

"MR. GEORGE'S DISMISSAL.—We regret to learn that F. W. George, Esq., A. M., Inspector of Schools for this County, has been dismissed from office.

On his appointment, about two years ago, we took occasion to object to a non resident being sent here to fill a County office; but the sequel has shown that the Superintendent of Education understood what he was doing when he sent a gentleman here, entirely disconnected with our local politics, and so eminently qualified to regulate and systematize the educational affairs of the County which had become so sadly disarranged in the hands of the previous incumbent.

That Mr. George's appointment, made at the time of the change of Administration, was sanctioned by the present Government, is evident from the fact that Mr. Annand telegraphed to Mr. Christie to hand over to Mr. George all the books and papers connected with his office. If the Government had a nominee, that was the time they should have made his appointment; then Mr. George would not have been led on by false hopes. But it seems they were willing that so efficient a person should bring the school matters of the County into effectual working before they made any appointment to the office.

Mr. George was enjoying a lucrative situation when he was persuaded to come here with the assurance that so long as the duties of the office should be faithfully discharged, it was permanent. He has removed his family here, and become one of our community—a good neighbor, a good citizen.

He has also won the entire confidence of Commissioners, Trustees, and Teachers as to his ability and devotion to educational interests; and the statistics we have published after each semi-annual meeting of the Board of Commissioners evince the very satisfactory progress in the efficiency and attendance at schools during his tenure of office.

His removal from office, we are assured, was not made with the concurrence of either of our local members, who, elected as they were from both parties, represent the entire electoral vote of the County.

Where formerly we received a succession of complaints, in reference to the discharge of the duties of the office, we have, for some time past heard none, but on the contrary expressions of satisfaction have reached us from persons of all classes and creeds.

Rev. Mr. Darragh, the newly appointed In-

spector, has also been badly used. If he was promised the office, as it is stated, it was unfair that he should be kept waiting two years in anxiety. Had he then been appointed, no injustice would have been done to Mr. George.

That interests of such paramount importance as those of education should be subject to fluctuations of political parties, or that offices of this kind should be a reward for political services, is deeply to be regretted. If this is the rule to be acted upon, it is difficult to say how soon another change may not be made."

The Presbyterian Witness denounces the transaction in the severest terms. Mr. Darragh is a Presbyterian minister, of a small congregation at Goose River, Cumberland County. Mr. George is also a Presbyterian, a most estimable man, a scholar and an industrious educationist.

We omitted in our last to mention that we had received a specimen sheet of a proposed new Monthly publication, "The Island Baptist" under the Editorial management of the Rev. John Davis. We can but reciprocate his friendly words towards ourselves, when he says "We shall seek to work with the Messenger, rather than against it, and hope in the end to do it more good than harm." Whatever may advance the cause of truth generally, and promote the well-being of our brethren on the Island in particular, has our best wishes, and our warmest commendation.

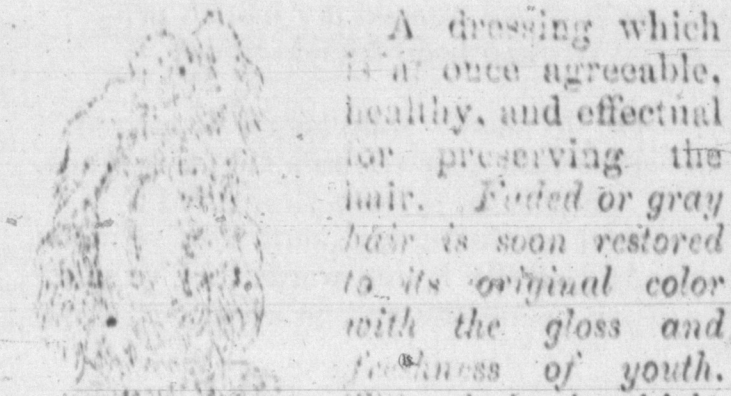
