It is doubtful if the former would be at all benefitted by any such connection. Such an institution should not have its real character hid. It is doubtful if its inmates would be benefitted by any attempt to misrepresent it before the public. Both institutions are of the utmost consequence, and would doubtless be the means of doing great good. We are glad to learn that the Rev. Mr. Almon has taken them in hand, and we hope that he may have his hands strengthened by the sympathy and co-operation of many others.

Y. M. C. A.—The Annual Meeting of the Young Men's Christian Association for the election of Officers, and other important business, will be held in their large room on Saturday evening next, 23rd inst., at half-past 7 o'clock, sharp. A full meeting of the membership is earnestly requested.

The Lecture delivered by the Rev. J. A. Rogers last week before the Y. M. C. Association was a very successful effort. The large audience was kept spell-bound for upwards of an hour listening to the eloquence of the lecturer on "True Greatness." He exposed the hollowness of all other greatness except that arising from goodness.

LAMENTABLE.—A Shoemaker named Knox died very suddenly in his shop in Creighton street on Tuesday of last week. An inquest was held the following day, and a verdict returned of "died by the visitation of God."

The widow was so affected by the sudden death of her husband that her reason fled a day or two after, and she was taken to Mount Hope, whilst the children were taken into the Orphan Asylum.

BURGLARY.—The shop of Messrs. Harris in Barrington Street was broken into on Tuesday night, and a large quantity of clothing stolen. Serjeant Hutt started in pursuit the next day. On passing up the road he found that three boys had been offering clothes for sale. The police constables caught them near the Prince's Lodge, each with a suit of the stolen clothes on, and large bundles of clothes on their arms. On being arrested and searched several keys and a file were found on them.

Their names are James Hughes, Patrick O'Donnell, and John Phillips. The eldest, Hughes, is only 16 years of age. He and O'Donnell have both served terms in the City Prison. After being examined before the Stipendiary Magistrate they were committed for trial before the Supreme Court.

A Frenchman, who gave his name as Sylvester Moultingate, of Tracadie, stole a considerable quantity of rope from a vessel at one of the wharves of the city, on Thursday night, and on the following day offered the plunder for sale at a price very far below its value. The man was arrested and conveyed to the Police Station.

The Will of the late Hon. B. Wier has been brought before the Equity Court, to have it determined what is the meaning of the word "or" whether it is equivalent to "and." Five or six lawyers are engaged for various parties concerned.

We learn that besides the personal legacies Mr. Wier left \$2000 to the Free Episcopalian Church in Halifax, and \$2000 to such other charitable institutions in the City of Halifax as the executors may think proper.

The arguments of the several counsel were heard, but judgment was reserved.

THE A. R. DUNLAP.—During the past week there have been others of the crew and passengers of this unfortunate vessel found. On Thursday eight bodies, including those of the captain and Mr. B. F. McKay were recovered. The body of the man first found was supposed by a woman in Halifax to be that of her son. On going to the spot where he was buried and the body being exhumed it was identified. It appears that he had been away from home six years in the U. States navy, and was returning home probably working his passage. It appears that she had a crew of seven, and six or seven passengers. Five was the number of passengers up to Saturday, Jan. 2nd. The vessel did not sail until Sunday, and the mate of the "Mayflower," which was in port at the time, says he saw several passengers go on board on Sunday morning. The agents' office being closed, they could not book themselves.

Some three or four dollars worth of fish was stolen from the fish market on Sunday night.

HALIFAX CO-OPERATIVE SOCIETY.—At the annual meeting of this society, held a few days since, a dividend of seven per cent was declared on the purchases made by shareholders at the society's store during the quarter. This is the largest dividend yet declared.—Chron.

YARMOUTH.—We learn from the *Herald* that the whole number of vessels owned in this county is 263, and their aggregate tonnage 81,896. Although the number of vessels is four less than last year, there is an increase of tonnage to the extent of 3,306 tons. The losses amounted to 9 vessels and 2,272 tons, and there were sold out of the County 12 vessels, registering 2,237 tons.

The younger of the boys went round to drive the dog into range, while the other stood ready to pop him at his appearance at the corner. Unfortunately, however, the dog (being quick) dodged back and the lad pursuing rounded the corner just in time to receive in the side, below the ribs, the shot aimed at the dog. The whole charge went directly through the body of the boy, carrying with it a portion of the clothes. The poor fellow survived but 15 minutes."

THE MANCHESTER EMBEZZLERS.—Garwood and Carr, arrested at this port for embezzlement in Manchester, and sent back to England, have been found guilty and sentenced, the former for 12 months, and the latter for 9 months imprisonment, with hard labor.
