We have received a copy of the eleventh annual report of Dr. Dewolf, Medical Superintendent of the Asylum for the Insane. From this we learn that the number of patients on the first day of the past year was 169.

SAD SHOOTING AFFAIR AT DARTMOUTH.—On Monday evening of last week Mr. William Gleason returned to his residence near the Episcopal Church and finding his wife in the garden, called her in to prepare his supper.

Mr. Gleason, it appears, is an Englishman, but had resided in Alabama several years before the late United States War. He held a commission in a cavalry regiment in the Southern Army till the close of the war, when he came to Halifax and has since been engaged in gold mining operations at Lawrencetown.
