

latter carrying heavy loads of yams over places where he would have to climb. They dare not express an opinion on any subject. He remembered once, while selling a piece of calico to a native woman, asking her what was her choice. The husband expressed astonishment at his asking such a question, and told him to tear off a piece and throw it to her. Mr. R. told him that while he was a trader he should certainly ask their opinion, and was glad to find that the women were now receiving better treatment. Though on the Islands not Christianized the people were rogues, thieves and liars, they were hospitable. But when they gave anything they expected something back; but the present must be given in an indirect manner, or offence will be taken. When he first took up his residence on the Island he received their presents in the old country fashion and thought no more about them—but he soon found out that it would not do, and consequently had to change his tactics in order to make the natives friendly. The dialects of the different Islands were altogether different, he had acquired only the language of Anseletum. The remarks of the speaker were listened to with eager interest.

FREDERICTON SEMINARY.—We are glad to see that our New Brunswick brethren have at length made an important step in the way of extinguishing the debt on their Seminary building. At the meeting of the Education Society, held at Jemseg, dated June 9th, (? July 9th.) Rev. J. E. Hopper moved, seconded by Rev. I. E. Bill—“That inasmuch as the whole amount of the Seminary debt has been subscribed, that we direct our collectors to collect forthwith, and pay into the hands of the President, Z. G. Gabel, Esq., St. John.”

The Editor of the Visitor rejoices in the prospect of getting rid of this “old incumbrance of so many years standing,” and anticipates that then, “we will all swell the chorus with joyous hearts: Happy day, happy day, When this old debt was wiped away.”

We learn from some of our Western Counties' exchanges that a Circus is about passing through the Province. If we knew of any good that would be likely to arise from a visit, we would advise our readers to patronize it, but from what we know of such exhibitions we believe they are invariably attended with pernicious effects. The feats of the horses and their riders are doubtless marvellous, and show what may be effected by the training of animals; but like the theatre, they have to be frequently spiced with indecent exposures and allusions to make them attractive to those who have more money than sense to use it properly.

The Editor of the Boston Watchman and Reflector is not well acquainted with the geography of the British Provinces. In speaking of the Rev. Dr. Cramp's retirement he states that he “has long and ably presided over Acadia College in New Brunswick.” He adds:—

Government House, Ottawa. Friday, 25th day of June, 1869.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor General in Council.

WHEREAS by Section 55, Cap. 6, 31st Victoria, the Governor in Council is authorized to make regulations respecting Warehousing Ports and Bonding Warehouses;—

His Excellency in Council on the recommendation of the Honorable the Minister of Customs, and under the authority aforesaid, has been pleased to Order and it is hereby ordered that in each of the Ports of Hamilton, London Toronto, and Kingston, in the Province of Ontario, in Montreal and Quebec, in the Province of Quebec, in St. John in the Province of New Brunswick, and in Halifax in the Province of Nova Scotia, each person obtaining or having the right or privilege of using any store or building or part of such store or building, as a Bonding Warehouse shall, for each privilege pay to the Collector of Customs, on the first day of September in each year, the sum of forty dollars and if the same shall remain unpaid for the term of one month thereafter, then the privilege of using such store or building as a Bonding Warehouse shall be cancelled.

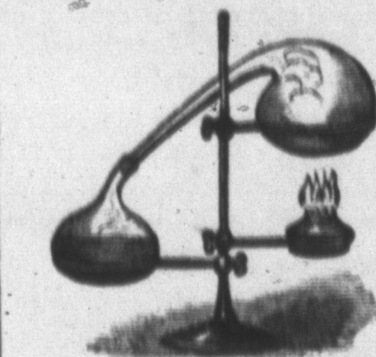
