His Excellency the Governor General in Council.

On the recommendation of the Honorable the Minister of Customs, and under and in virtue of the 8th section of the Act 31 Vic., Cap. 6, intitled: "An Act respecting the Customs."

His Excellency has been pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that Sheet Harbor, situate in the County of Halifax East, in the Province of Nova Scotia, shall be and the same is hereby declared to be an Out Port of Entry, under the Survey of the Port of Halifax.

And it is further ordered that the Out Port of Tangier, now under the Survey of the said Port of Halifax, be and the same is hereby abolished.
