FORM classification and licensing of teachers." Could anything be plainer?

The Hon. J. W. (now Judge) Ritchie said upon this matter of the power of the Council to issue licenses without submitting the candidates to the usual mode of examination :

"The Council of Public Instruction has no power to create a new system of examinations other than that established by the Act. (of 1867.) "That candidates who have not furnished any written exercises for the Board of Provincial Examiners, and obtained a license in accordance with the reports of that body, will not in my opinion, be legally entitled to conduct schools and draw grants under the Acts."

Judge Ritchie's opinion appears pretty conclusive on this matter.




