hammers, swinging from thousands of strong arms, and doing duty on the heads of rivets along the iron sides of scores of great ships, and some notion of the din which fell upon my ears may be obtained. It was a change, not by any means unpleasant, to pass away from this music through Glen Leven, to the waters of Loch Lomond .-Here the railroad passes along the margin of a rivulet which has been immortalized in a Scottish song. Smollet, whose home was by its side, wrote the following beautiful lines :-

" No torrept stains thy limpid source, No rocks impede thy dimpling course, That sweetly warbles o'er its bed, With white round polished | ebbles spread.

Devolving from thy parent lake, A charming maze thy waters make, By bowers of birch and groves of pine, And hedges flowered with eglantine.'

The hour for the mail to close has nearly arrived, and you are indebted to that fact for not having a very long letter inflicted upon you. I will, therefore, crave your indulgence for another letter, in which I will say something more of our first days experience in Scotland.

IN MEMORIAM.

MRS. JESSIE MCLEAN,

died very suddenly at West River, East Point, P. E. Island, Aug. 25th, Jessie, widow of the late Alexander McLean, in the 69th year of her age. The deceased was up and attending to the affairs of her household on the morning of her death; her rest being disturbed the preceeding night in consequence of attending on an indisposed daughter, she remarked to another of her daughters that she would retire to rest for a short time. It was her mother who said, when there were only two or three professors of religion in this place, "If Leould only see a little house built for God and his worship held in it I would be satisfied.' When the first prayer meeting was held in the little log school house, her soul was fill with joy. She was asked if she was satisfied now, "Not yet" was the answer "but if I saw a little church organized, and the Lord's Supper administered I think I could then say "Lord now let thy servant depart in peace for mine eyes have seen thy salvation"; she saw all this and when asked again Are you satisfied now, her answer was "O how can I while there is a sinner out of Christ in this place?' Widow McLean, her daughter, possessed a like deeprooted piety as her mother. It may be truly said that she was adorned with that meek and quiet spirit which in the sight of God is of great price. In her death the family have lost a mother whose prayers in their behalf have gone up to the throne of God perfumed with the blood of the Lamb. The occasion was improved by the writer at the house of the deceased on the day of the funeral, from the words of Joh " I know that thou wilt bring me to death and to the house appointed unto all living " and at the grave from the words of Jesus to Martha " I am the resurrection and the life."
