When he looked at the splendid testimonial which had been presented, he would be cheered and animated in the work which was still before him, and by which he hoped to continue to render some service to the denomination. When he was gone, his children would look at that testimonial and be comforted by the thought that their father had been loved and honoured by his brethren.

The Address had reminded him of the events of past years. Nineteen years ago, on his arrival in this country to assume the presidency of the College, the ever-to-be-lamented Professor Chipman was his only colleague, and the number of students very small. Eighteen years ago, the Professor had sunk beneath the waves of the Basin of Minas, and with him lay four of our students, and a beloved ministering brother (Rev. E. D. Very) from the neighbouring province. It seemed then as if Acadia College were wrecked, never again to rise to the surface. But God took care of it. The "Child of Providence" could not die. It lived and thrived; and now the Institution enjoys the services of six professors, giving instruction to upwards of forty students, and its prospects are brightening every day. He (Dr. C.) rejoiced that the College was under the efficient care of the brother who had succeeded him, and whose first year of office has successfully closed, and he trusted that he would be spared to preside at many future Anniversaries, with continued manifestations of divine favour. Again thanking the friends by whose kindness so costly an expression of regard had been presented, he prayed God to bless them all.

This concluded the varied and somewhat exciting exercises of Anniversary day at Wolfville. We are precluded from further enlarging on the several parts which appeared to give so much pleasure to all concerned. The facts are perhaps their own best commentators. Where so much is crowded into so small a space of time, it is difficult to speak of each part in its proper place, and in due proportion.

It will be well to remember that although Acadia College has been so much blessed in the past, it is nevertheless not less in need of the prayers and aid of its friends throughout the provinces—each of which has its fair quota of students there. Although prayer in the past has been answered in large blessings, yet the College has still a great work to accomplish, and is in excellent working order for doing it. Perhaps no sight is more calculated to awaken prayerful interest in the institution, than was a glance at the young gentlemen composing the long line of students, as they passed from the College proper to the audience room of the church. One could but feel how much power for good existed in them, and might be evoked by each having his learning and powers sanctified to the highest purposes of life. How much of joy would all the members of the Faculty, the governors, and the supporters feel could they know that none of the scepticism and materialism so prevalent in some quarters, or the ritualistic notions in others, would be allowed to damage the genuine Christianity inculcated with the sound learning received at their institutions. To this end let prayer continually arise before the throne of Heavenly grace.

The examinations in the early part of the week of the Horton Collegiate Academy, and Grand Prê Ladies Seminary were highly satisfactory. At the latter two young ladies Misses Pinceo and Wickwire received, at the hands of the Rev. Dr. Cramp, diplomas of proficiency in the prescribed course.
