I request the favor, therefore, that persons who either sent or paid me sums, will carefully examine my account, and, if they detect any error, inform me. Also, should any have found money, especially in the Vestry of the Baptist Meeting House in Fredericton, where diverse sums were given me, they may know pretty well to whom it should be sent.

No one aware of the onerous and diversified duties that devolved on me at Convention, and the incessant care, toil, and ultimate perplexity and trouble experienced by me—producing severe illness—can reasonably wonder at a mistake in a figure, or the losing of money, in some instances handed to me in the midst of mental labor demanding my whole attention.
