SUPREME COURT.—The April sittings commenced on Tuesday 26th. The Court room has been supplied with new desks and seats for the legal gentlemen.

William Stevens, sergeant, Edward Stowe, corporal, John Groome, private, and James Wynn's, private, all of the 84th regiment, for gagging and tying a private of the regiment, thereby causing his death.

Alonzo Grant, for stealing gold bearing quartz at Waverly.

The very Rev. Principal Ross, D. D. occupied the chair.—In his opening address he explained the position of the college and urged the necessity for an addition to its funds.

He stated that 65 students had attended the classes during the session—an increase on any previous year.

Prof Johnston reported that the Committee had not awarded Rev. Mr. Grant's prize as none of the competitors, from a misunderstanding of the work expected, had fairly earned it.

Subsequently addresses were given, by Charles Robson and A. M. Uniacke, Esquires.

Rev. A. S. Hunt was next invited to speak. He expressed warm interest in the College and his sympathy with students generally.
